

Cedar Vally Plane Crash Kills One, Injures Second Man

A southern Utah man was killed Sunday and a Provo man injured when a Cessna 150 commuter plane crashed three miles southeast of the Cedar Valley Airport.

James David Sullivan, Glen Canyon City, Kane County, died about three hours after the 8:20 p.m. crash according to Sgt. Dean Kirkham of the Utah County Sheriff's Office.

James R. Hanegan, Provo, was listed in fair condition at Utah Valley Hospital Monday.

The two men were apparently on a training flight from Cedar Valley Airport at about 8 p.m. Sunday when the pilot of the single engine plane made two attempts to land. It was, however, too dark to make a safe landing on the unlighted runway, and the pilot headed for the Provo Airport.

As the plane was flying over a small hill southeast of the Cedar Valley Airport, it apparently struck the south end of the hill and bounced about 60

yards north where it came to rest on its top. Both victims were thrown from the plane with Mr. Sullivan found directly in front of the plane and Mr. Hanegan about 30 feet behind it.

Persons at the airport heard the sounds of the crash shortly after the aircraft was out of view and the Utah County Sheriff's office was notified.

Sgt. Kirkham and Dep. Jay Colledge directed the Utah County Jeep Patrol on a ground search while Larry Patterson, owner of the downed aircraft began searching from the air. He spotted the crash at about 10:45 p.m. and directed the jeep patrol to the site.

Jeep patrol members arrived at the crash site a few minutes later and found both men alive. Mr. Sullivan died about a half hour later. The men were taken to the hospital by Lehi ambulance.

It was not known late Monday who the pilot of the air-

plane was, Sheriff Mack Holley said.

The crash was the second involving a light plane in the area on Sunday. At 3:50 p.m., a single engine Cessna 172 flying from St. George to Lehi was forced to make an emergency landing on a road near Cedar Fort when an engine malfunction occurred. No one was injured and the plane was not damaged according to Jim Kelson, supervisor of the Salt Lake Flight Service office.
