FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

CITY HALL SECURES 10,000 ACRE FEET OF WATER Enough Water for Approximately 13,000 More Homes Now Available

The Central Utah Water Board has approved a preliminary allocation of 10,000 acre feet of water for Eagle Mountain City. This water allocation comes after months of effort by Mayor Brian Olsen and City Hall staffers to communicate the need for securing future water in the rapidly growing city. The 10,000 acre feet would provide water for approximately 13,000 homes.

"Our city has overcome a critical issue," said Mayor Olsen. "This is a huge achievement to provide a permanent supply of water to this valley."

The Board also approved the engineering design of the first phase of a western pipeline alignment that would come out of Orem to a water reservoir located between Saratoga Springs and Eagle Mountain.

This contract also allows the city to request additional water from the Central Utah Water Board and to be one of the cities given priority for additional water from an established reserve pool.

Although Eagle Mountain currently has enough water for the next few years, this allocation ensures a water supply for many years in the future.

The city had previously received approval from the state engineer to put 3,000 acre feet of the 10,000 total into existing wells as a reserve until the pipeline is available.

"Securing the next 25-30 years of water for our city is a major milestone," Mayor Olsen said.

Q & A WITH MAYOR OLSEN

Q: As you are aware, the traffic light at the Ranches Parkway is up and functioning. Will this traffic light be a "smart light" with the capability of "knowing" when a car is at its crossway? I've noticed that there will be numerous cars lined up to turn into the Ranches waiting at a red light, with no other cars in sight from either of the other 3 directions.

A: Tim, thank you for your question. According to Geoff Dupaix, Public Information Officer for UDOT, there was a problem with the signal's detection equipment shortly after it was installed. UDOT has since repaired the equipment and we should be seeing improvement in traffic flow.

Other residents have asked about the left turn arrow being the only option for westbound traffic to enter The Ranches. Dupaix's response is that with the high speed of the highway, UDOT felt it was safer to have a dedicated left turn signal, rather than a yield option.

UDOT is asking any residents who notice problems with traffic flow or signal function to call 227-8000 to report it.

News Notes

Alpine School District Bond Plan Includes New High School and Elementary School

A \$230 million bond and leeway proposal that would cover the costs of adding five elementary schools, two middle schools, and one high school to the Alpine School District will be on the November 7 election ballot.

One of the elementary schools in the proposal would be located in Eagle Mountain and the high school site is in Saratoga Springs.

The bond would cover construction costs for the schools and the leeway funds are for operational costs of schools such as heating and lighting. Leeway funds also pay for essential personnel and professional development for teachers.

"Our overcrowding problem is only going to get worse," says Jennifer Webb, an Eagle Mountain resident and Alpine School District Community Council Representative. "This bond is the only way to get new construction."

According to a presentation given to Eagle Mountain City by Alpine School District Superintendent Dr. Vernon Henshaw and Financial Director Rob Smith, the cost to homeowners after a four-year implementation of the leeway and bond would be less than \$5 per month.

"Pony Express Elementary has one of the highest populations in the Alpine School District," says PTA President Bea Twede. "So for us it's not just important to pass it – it's imperative."

When the previous bond was on the ballot, 96% of Eagle Mountain voters voted to pass it, which Smith called "unprecedented." Smith hopes to find the same support from residents on November 7.

Eagle Mountain Neighbors To Appear On Trading Spaces in November

Christie Gardiner and Brenda Heal are next-door neighbors, friends, and will soon be co-stars of the popular television show "Trading Spaces" on cable's The Learning Channel (TLC).

The "Trading Spaces" crew was in Eagle Mountain August 22-24 to tape an episode featuring Gardiner and Heal (with their respective husbands Doug and Lance) redoing each other's master bedroom. Gardiner applied to be on the show without telling the Heals or her husband, until they were selected for the final interviews.

For those who haven't seen the program during its sixyear run on TLC, the premise is that two couples swap houses for 48 hours and redecorate a room. The show culminates with a surprise reveal to each team of neighbors and the hope that each party will be pleased with their new room and friendships will stay intact.

Typically the budget for the show is \$1,000, but the Gardiners and Heals are featured on a special episode where the budget was increased for the first time to \$4,000. They also worked with two veteran designers - Frank Bielec, who is known as the "king of country" and Doug Wilson, whose opinions don't always jibe with home owners. Resident hunky carpenter Carter Oosterhouse worked with the two teams.

Although the designers had worked in Utah before, both were impressed with Eagle Mountain.

"They've done a nice job here in terms of development," Wilson, a New Yorker, said. "There is a sense of community, and it's nice that the houses aren't all the same."

Bielec, who lives in Katy, Texas, said "I love the vibe here. "It's very clean and beautiful."

Both designers also enjoyed the experience with their

Gardiner and Heal are equally complimentary about their experience with the designers and crew.

"They are even more fun in person than on the show," said long-time fan Gardiner.

For Heal, the hardest part of the whole experience was when the crew packed up and the trucks pulled away.

"It was so much fun," Heal said. "It was hard to come back down to reality."

Part of that new reality is a professionally designed master bedroom. The families are not allowed by contract to publicly speak about their reaction to the redone room until the show airs. One result is clear – they're still friends.

ARCHAIC PETROGLYPHS LOCATED IN
EAGLE MOUNTAIN
Mayor and Developers Working Together to
Preserve Ancient Art

Petroglyphs which experts say date back to archaic people who lived anywhere from 2,000 to 6,000 years ago are located in Eagle Mountain.

The rock art is on privately owned land that is soon to be developed into a residential subdivison. Mayor Brian Olsen is working with the developers, Eagle Mountain Ranch, LLC to ensure the preservation of these historic petroglyphs.

"I will do everything we can to protect these amazing sites," said Olsen. "We are certainly blessed to have such a rich history available to us."

The developers have already incorporated the petroglyphs into their plans for the Oquirrh Heights subdivison, a 182 acre development that includes 477 single family home lots and 64 acres of open space, including parks and trails. The plans have an open space parcel around the site of the petroglyphs, with a trail going by it.

Also being considered in the plans is signage that would describe the rock art and its historical importance.

"It is some of the oldest rock art in Utah," said Nina Bowen of the Utah Rock Art Society (URAS). "Its style is very unique."

Eagle Mountain City consulted URAS about the best ways to preserve the petroglyphs. The next step the city is considering is establishing an ordinance that would assess steep fines for vandalism of the historic rock.

Olsen has requested URAS to submit a proposal for a survey to see if there are more petroglyphs in the area.
