# CITY COUNCIL UNITED

Members Working Together to Ease Transition in Wake of Mayor Olsen's Resignation

Following Mayor Brian Olsen's resignation on Friday, October 20, Linn Strouse, senior member of the City Council, was chosen in a special meeting October 21 to serve as Mayor Pro Tem. Strouse will serve until an interim mayor is appointed by the council at a special meeting on November 14.

The City Council will accept letters of interest for the position of mayor through November 9. It is required by state law that applicants must be registered voters who have lived in Eagle Mountain City at least 365 days.

At this time the position of mayor is full-time according to a city ordinance. It was discussed by some council members that there would be a possibility of amending the ordinance for the interim mayor to be part-time, if it was determined to be necessary to get the right person for the job. The interim mayor would serve until the November 2007 election, where the elected mayor would finish the last two years of Olsen's term.

"It is an unfortunate truth that Eagle Mountain City has dealt with controversy within the city administration in the past," Strouse said. "However, it is a testament to the current City Council and the staff, that the city continues to thrive in spite of these challenges. It is our desire that anything that can be done to prevent these negative issues from occurring in the future, will be done."

# Q & A

Q: I think a bus system for the Eagle Mountain City and Saratoga Springs linking up with the Lehi busses would be a great help to our city. Will we have busses in the near future? It would seem to me a great help to businesses and families here.

A: At this time EM and SS have not joined the UTA district. To do so would require both cities to put an item on a ballot and voters would have to agree to a quarter cent sales tax to be paid into the UTA system. Until that happens, UTA is not authorized to run bus service out here. According to UTA spokesman Justin Jones, there is an "Opinion Question" for Utah County on the November 7 ballot which, if passed, would begin the process of bringing a commuter rail system to Main Street in Lehi. Jones estimates service would begin using the Union Pacific track in 2009, with service to Salt Lake and Provo on a high speed train with minimal stops. He says commuters could arrive at either location in 35-40 minutes.

# **Deputy Donates Kidney to Wife**

In the ten years Deputy John Mulder has worked for the Utah County Sheriff's Department he's had more than a few scuffles with burly law breakers.

However, it was something small, less than a pound actually, that forced him off duty recently. Mulder donated one of his kidneys to his wife Carla and has been recovering for a couple of months.

"When I met my husband, I gave him my heart," says Carla Mulder. "Twenty-five years later, he gave me his kidney."

Carla learned she was in complete kidney failure six months ago. Prior to that she had been feeling extremely tired and wanted to sleep all the time. Doctors first treated her for depression, until a blood test revealed the correct diagnosis. She underwent dialysis treatments for five months and prepared for a transplant.


It was initially recommended that a blood relative donor would work best. John and Carla's two adult sons and Carla's two sisters were prepared to be tested as donors when it was discovered a virus had caused her kidney failure. Doctors told them with a blood related donor there was a possibility she could get the virus again.

At that point, John immediately offered to be tested and it was discovered that he was a good match. Two weeks later, both Mulders were on the operating table. Carla stayed in the hospital a week and John was there five days. All signs indicate that Carla's body has accepted the kidney well.


Though the recovery process has been painful for John, he says he wouldn't hesitate to do it again.

"We've had our own little miracle," he said.

So anyone in the city with a lead foot had better watch out. Eagle Mountain's own "Speed Zapper" will be back to work soon and watching for violators. He may be one kidney lighter, but he's still quick.

#### **Accounting Software Saves City Money**

Three city employees recently attended training to learn about more uses for the city-owned Springbrook accounting software and consequently saved the city thousands of dollars and valuable time.

Juanita Steinbrenner from the city's building department learned how to program and maintain reports that an outside agency would charge at least \$2,000 to do.

Jenalee Cheever from the planning department found ways to streamline the process of issuing and maintaining business licenses and permits.

Glen Sexton, senior accountant in the finance department, discovered many ways to save time using the software and provide better service for residents- including the option for online bill pay and automatic payment deductions.

At the training meeting, Sexton was elected to be the regional coordinator for the Western States Regional Users Group for Springbrook which includes employees from Arizona, Utah, Idaho, and Eastern Oregon.

Sexton was pleased the time spent in training resulted in so many improvements in the city's accounting system. He points to the sign on his office wall as the motivation for his efforts:

"If I did not come in today to be a public servant... then I should have stayed home."

#### Correction

Last month's newsletter incorrectly reported that the state engineer had approved a 3,000 acre feet interim transfer of water out of the 10,000 acre feet water allocation to Eagle Mountain from the Central Utah Water Conservancy District for use out of wells. The Central Utah Water Conservancy District Board of Trustees approved the allocation and authorized the staff to work with Eagle Mountain City, but no application has been filed with the Utah State Engineer for the 3,000 acre feet transfer and no water transfer has been considered or approved for Eagle Mountain from the water allocated by the Central Utah Water Conservancy District.

# EAGLE MOUNTAIN TEEN IS STATE BMX CHAMPION

Dominic Weber, 13, of Eagle Mountain has only been involved in BMX racing for about a year, but he earned the title of State BMX Champion in September at the RAD Canyon BMX State Championship Finals held in West Jordan.

Weber, whose ability level is designated as intermediate, scored the best overall points to beat out even the expert racers in his age bracket for the title.

"I've always liked to ride bikes and jump them," Weber says. "About a year ago my dad's friend told me about BMX racing and I went to a practice round and just fell in love with it."

For the championship he received a number one number plate for his bike, a three foot tall trophy, a plaque, and a jacket.

In addition to the state championship title, Weber has been competing in national competitions such as the Great Salt Lake Nationals, and events in Las Vegas and Reno where he has consistently placed in the top five. Most recently he was in a national competition in New Mexico the weekend of October 27.

Supported in his BMX efforts by his family, who often spend weekends accompanying him to competitions, Weber's dad Jeff says he doesn't have any concerns about Dominic's involvement in racing beyond the occasional injury he sustains.

"One time he jumped and overshot the handlebars," Jeff Weber said. "He hurt his hands and scraped up his face. That's the worst injury he's had."

Along with mending the bumps and bruises that go with the sport, Jeff Weber has been teaching his son how to handle the disappointments of competitive racing, as well as the victories.

#### Miss Teen EM Competes in State Pageant

On Saturday, October 22, Miss Oustanding Teen Eagle Mountain Amanda Lifferth competed in Utah's Outstanding Teen pageant in Lehi. The scholarship pageant is part of the Miss America organization.

Lifferth performed a modern ballet routine for her talent, had a personal interview and on-stage interview, and participated in evening gown and lifestyle and fitness segments of the pageant.

"Usually I'm shy, and the pageant helped me to gain more confidence in myself," Lifferth said.

Fifteen young women from around the state participated in the pageant. The winner, Lindsey Brinton of Salt Lake Valley won a \$2,000 scholarship and will represent our state at the national pageant in Orlando, Florida in August of 2007.

Of her experience Lifferth said, "It was fun. The girls were really nice."

#### Gas "Green Sticker" Program

Eagle Mountain City has received many questions about participation in the "Green Sticker" program for natural gas furnaces and/or water heating appliances. Eagle Mountain City owns and operates its own natural gas utility and is not required to participate in this program. The City's natural gas is provided through Kern River which delivers a different composition of gas from Questar.

The Green Sticker program was approved in 1998 by the Utah Public Service Commission (PSC) to accommodate the changing composition of natural gas delivered to Questar Gas's system. It does not affect the gas utility in Eagle Mountain City.

Eagle Mountain City maintains it is always a good idea for customers to have their appliances checked and, if necessary, adjusted to ensure continued proper, safe and efficient operation. If residents have concerns about the operation of their appliances, please contact a heating and air conditioning contractor for an independent inspection.

#### City Historians Needed




#### **Christmas Concert**
