EAGLE MOUNTAIN UPDATE

FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

I appreciate the numerous emails I have received from Eagle Mountain citizens. In response to these emails, I would like to address four specific topics this month: snow removal, transportation, schools, and commercial/economic development.



Citizens have expressed concern over the road conditions of SR73 and Red-wood Road after heavy snowfalls. After contacting UDOT (Utah Department of Transportation), they have committed to adding another snow plow truck to their route, as well as salting the roads more heavily. This should improve the conditions on these two roads.

Regarding transportation, I met with Darrell Cook of MAG (Mountainland Association of Governments) and talked with Senator Mark Madsen. The 1000 South Project has been approved for the environmental impact study and the study has been initiated. Although the 18-month study must be completed before the state will allow the new road construction to begin, we are relieved the process has begun.

In reference to schools, I met with Rob Smith of the Alpine School District. He indicated that Alpine School District is looking for property to purchase in The Ranches for a new elementary school. They plan to break ground for the school in June 2007. We stressed the need as well for additional facilities in Eagle Mountain City Center. Rob indicated that Eagle Valley Elementary is slated for an addition of eight new classrooms in 2008.

Finally, many citizens have asked about commercial/economic development. Since the beginning of 2007, we have had a significant increase in the number of commercial groups interested in Eagle Mountain. The city is currently negotiating with a grocery store chain, a fast food chain, a gas station, and a retail manufacturer. Additionally, a new cable company, PrimeVision, LLC, has just been approved by the City Council to come to Eagle Mountain as well.

I am excited about the progress we are making and the growth that is taking place. Our efforts together as citizens and families, elected officials, and city employees are continuing to improve the city in which we live.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR FINALISTS INTERVIEWED Decision Expected Soon

The final two candidates for Eagle Mountain's city administrator position were interviewed by the City Council in a special meeting on February 15. John Hendrickson, former city manager of Draper, and Brent Bluth, former administrative services director of Bluffdale, were each given 45 minutes to introduce themselves to City Council members and answer their questions.

Hendrickson and Bluth were chosen from a field of 48 applicants for the position.

"I have been pleased with the quality of city administrator candidates," Mayor Richardson said. "Both finalists bring with them excellent experience and talent."

Hendrickson has over 30 years of city management experience. He began his career as the first city manager for Payson, and most recently served as city manager for Draper from January 2006 through December 2006. He is also an army veteran and earned a master's degree in public administration from Brigham Young University.

Of his career choice Hendrickson said, "I enjoy being part of government and doing things that bring benefit to people's lives."

Also an MPA holder from Brigham Young University, Bluth was administrative services director for Bluffdale from May 2003 through January 2007. He was previously assistant city manger and economic development director for Payson. A former linguist in the Utah National Guard, he also served as a city council member for Elk Ridge City from 1995-1999.

Bluth said his strengths include the ability to "take what you hope the community will be and translate that into plans."

Eagle Mountain began its search for a city administrator November 7, 2006 after the City Council voted to change the existing chief of staff position to a city administrator. The final decision will be made by Mayor Richardson and may be announced by the next City Council meeting on March 6.

the city's human resources coordinator. She originally started with the city in 2001 as the deputy city recorder and transitioned to the human resources position when it was created in 2004.


DeAnna has been married for 26 years and is the mother of 10 children and grandmother to 25 children. Most of her family lives in Utah and she enjoys being close to them.

Also, as you begin your spring yard care, make sure that the area within three feet in all directions from any fire hydrant is cleared of natural growth or plants, so they can easily be seen by the fire department if needed.

"Pageants have gotten a bad rap this year with controversy from some national pageants," Lojik said. "This pageant is not centered on looks. It's about being a well-rounded person with talents to share. Even if you didn't win, being part of the pageant and the organization is a great experience that is worth your time."

The Miss Eagle Mountain pageant is affiliated with the Miss America organization and Lojik will represent the city in the Miss Utah pageant this June. SAWYER BROWN TO PERFORM AT EAGLE MOUNTAIN'S PONY EXPRESS DAYS Tickets On Sale Now

Popular country music group Sawyer Brown will be in concert at Eagle Mountain's Silver Lake Amphitheater on Saturday, June 2 - the final night of the city's tenth anniversary Pony Express Days celebration.

Tickets are on sale now at SmithsTix.com or any SmithsTix outlets. A limited number of tickets are also available for purchase at City Hall, 1650 E. Stagecoach Run, 789-6603. The price for tickets is \$9 - children two and younger are free.

According to a SmithsTix representative, people began calling to ask for tickets to see the popular band in Eagle Mountain soon after their contract was approved by the City Council on February 6.

Sawyer Brown came to prominence after winning first place on the television show "Star Search" (the "American Idol" of the

1980s). Now after 23 years they've performed over 3,500 shows and earned gold and platinum albums featuring hits such as "The Walk", "Some Girls Do", and "The Dirt Road." The five man band consists of frontman Mark Miller, bassist Jim Scholten, drummer Joe Smyth, keyboardist Greg Hubbard, and guitarist Shayne Hill.

The group has a devoted fan base that Miller recognizes in the band's biography. "It's almost like Jimmy Buffett's fans who come not because of the new record or the new song, but because they know they're gonna have fun," he says. "We've got kids who grew up listening to their parents' records coming now - and they're totally into it."
