EAGLE MOUNTAIN UPDATE

FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

You may have read articles in the *Deseret News, Pony Express* and *Daily Herald* regarding Eagle Mountain's recent emphasis on commercial development. As a city government, we are concerned with the quality of life in Eagle Mountain and are actively pursuing improvements to that quality of life. Having a tax base to draw upon correlates directly with the moneys the city has available for city improvements and enhancements.

I recently met with Senators Hatch and Bennett in Washington D.C., as well as Congressman Cannon. Councilman Vincent Liddiard, who was in Washington D.C. on business, took the day off to accompany me to these meetings. We communicated with them concerning the rapid growth of our city and the need for federal moneys.

We asked for federal moneys to assist in road construction to help alleviate our transportation issues. We also asked for funds to help develop a planned 60 acre park. The land has been donated by SITLA. The park will be located between the Ranches and City Center and will include walking trails, baseball diamonds, soccer fields, a water feature, and other recreation facilities. A park of this size should increase home values and attract economic development around the area as well.

Additionally, we have begun the process of a CDA (Community Development Area) approval for the city. A CDA status will allow the city to use city sales tax revenues as a negotiating tool with businesses that are looking at Eagle Mountain – thereby increasing their incentives to locate here.

Finally, the city receives tax moneys from the state based upon our recorded city population. We have discovered that the state's census records indicate that Eagle Mountain has a population of approximately 10,343 – and this is the number they

In actuality, our population is approximately 20,000 - a significant difference in numbers. Consequently, we will request (along with three other cities which are facing the same issue) a formal review of the census records for Eagle Mountain. This census correction will not only benefit the City in sales tax revenues but the increased population will also help with the qualifications for grants and government funding.

While so many of these issues are a work in progress and require time to realize the results we are seeking – putting considerable effort into Eagle Mountain's economic development, transportation and quality of life will certainly pay off. I would ask that all of our residents help in these efforts by making your voice heard at the transportation open houses presented by UDOT and MAG and by letting people know what a great place Eagle Mountain is to live and do business in.

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SEASONED CITY ADMINISTRATOR HIRED **City Council Approves Contract With Unanimous Vote**

The Eagle Mountain City Council unanimously voted to approve a contract for John Hendrickson as city administrator on March 6.

"I'm excited Mr. Hendrickson is here," Mayor Don Richardson said. "He brings a depth of experience, mentoring ability, and a well of knowledge Eagle Mountain will be able to draw upon."

Hendrickson has over 30 years of city management experience. He began his career as the first city manager for Payson, and most recently served as city manager for Draper from January 2006 through December 2006.

He is also an army veteran, a former employee of the Central Intelligence Agency, and earned a master's degree in public administration from Brigham Young University.

"I'm very pleased by the unanimous vote," Hendrickson said. "I will do my very best to uphold the trust of the mayor and City Council."

A week after the vote, Hendrickson began work and hasn't had much down time since. He has been meeting people and learning about important issues the city is facing, such as transportation and commercial growth. Currently he is spending a lot of time on preparing the budget for the new fiscal year.

Undaunted by the challenge of a city that manages their own utilities, Hendrickson has had that experience with other cities and knows what needs to be done. He will be working on long-term goals to ensure the city has the necessary supply of natural resources and the ability to reduce utility costs for residents.

Following his first couple of weeks on the job Hendrickson said, "There is much to do and I don't think I'll ever be lacking for work."

UDOT SR73 PUBLIC MEETING

In order to better understand future transportation needs along the state Route 73 corridor, the Utah Department of Transportation will host a public open house for area citizens Wednesday, April 18, from 4:30 PM to 7:00 PM at the Eagle Mountain City Council chambers located at 1650 East Stagecoach Run.

The meeting will be conducted in an open-house format. Project team members will be available to meet one-on-one with area residents, commuters, and business owners to discuss their opinions and solutions regarding the S.R. 73 corridor. As part of the corridor study, UDOT is looking at several aspects such as safety, sidewalks, maintenance, road width, alignment, and traffic.

News Notes

Burn Permits Available – The fire department is currently issuing burn permits. A one day permit for residences is \$10 and agricultural permits are \$25 for one year. An agricultural permit is required for areas at least two acres or larger and/or areas that generate income from the land.

An ordinance was passed this year allowing burn permits to be issued on site after the fire department approves the site and what is to be burned. NO Hazardous materials or rubbish is to be burned. You may burn weeds, yard waste, trees, tree limbs or trunks.

For residences, the homeowner must have some means to extinguish the fire if it gets out of control and still maintains all legal liabilities related to receiving a burn permit.

There is no permit required for cooking fires or barbeques. However even permitted fires can be put out if the fires are considered nuisances.

Burn permits will not be issued for property that is not owned or leased to the occupant.

To request a burn permit inspection, contact Roberta at 789-6701 or Fire Station 1 at 789-5010. Weather conditions must be good for the inspection.

Providence Dr.) to allow area residents to respond to UDOT's improvement plans for SR68 from Bangerter Hwy to Pony Express (7200 N.) in Saratoga Springs. Gas Rates — The city's summer gas rates will take effect on April 1, 2007.

Spring Clean-Up Coming Soon — The city will be providing dumpsters for residents' use as part of Spring Clean-Up from April 16-30. The dumpsters will be located inside the gates of the Public Works Building, 2545 N. Sweetwater Rd., and will be available Monday-Friday from 7:30 AM to 5:30 PM and Saturday from 8:00 AM to Noon.

The city will have six dumpsters available during the clean-up period. Once those six dumpsters are full, we will not be able to accept any more garbage. We are also not able to accept appliances or other large items that do not fit in the dumpster. Please be sure you can lift your items into the dumpster before bringing them down to the Public Works Building.

Summer Youth Sports Camps and Tackle Football Coming to Eagle Mountain

Former Brigham Young University and NFL football player Jamal Willis is partnering with Eagle Mountain City to provide additional sports opportunities for young people in our community. Registration begins April 7 for sports camps to be held in Eagle Mountain this summer that offer training in football, baseball, basketball, soccer, and cheerleading. For those interested in playing in a tackle football league or cheerleading for tackle football, registration also begins April 7.

Willis, an Eagle Mountain resident since 2001, and his staff of experienced athletes from the Fast Sports Training Program design the sports camps to help youth from ages 3-14 develop athletic skills while having fun. The staff includes former and current college and professional players.

The tackle football program is part of the National Youth Football League, which

started 10 years ago in Las Vegas and was brought to Utah by Willis four years ago. The NYFL is modeled after the NFL, with professional looking uniforms and team names taken from NFL teams. The NYFL games are against teams from other cities in Utah County.

Experienced with the NFL from his four years of post-college experience with the San Francisco 49ers and Denver Broncos, Willis started playing football at age six and is now an academic counselor for the BYU football team. He says athletics are important beyond just being good exercise.

"Playing sports helped instill a good work ethic in me," Willis said. "It also helps young people to learn how to deal with the challenges of life. When times are tough you can use your experiences from sports to get stronger and



The preliminary schedule for Eagle Mountain City's 10th Anniversary Pony Express Days celebration has been announced. The annual event will be held this year from Thursday, May 31 through Tuesday, June 5.

"We wanted to make it extra special this year to commemorate our 10th anniversary," said Angie Ferre, special events coordinator.

In addition to traditional events such as a carnival, baby contest, parade, and golf tournament, new activities have been added this year. This includes a Battle of the Bands where groups in the country-western



genre will compete to be the opening act at the Sawyer Brown concert Saturday night. The Eagle Mountain Update debuts a new business section this month that will profile local businesses. One of the city's longest standing businesses, The Ranches Golf Club with its 18 hole championship course broke ground in 2001 and opened to the public in 2003.



The course spans 220 acres and provides golfers with a Scottish Linksstyle experience. Designed by Steve McFarland, of the Ron Garl de-

sign group, the course was created to play a challenging 7,085 yards from the back tees, yet offer multiple tee boxes to cater to players of all skill levels.

Other features at the Golf Club include a new driving range that will open April 9, 2007, a practice green, a retail shop with everything from accessories to golf clubs, a variety of equipment for different skill levels, and lessons with the golf pro. Also provided is a fine dining option at the Three Peaks Grille restaurant. The 65 seat restaurant offers a cozy eating experience and has a big screen TV. A 175 seat banquet pavilion is also available.

This year, along with the new driving range, the course is offering a new Hole 9. William Neff, of Salt Lake City, designed it to complement and enhance the course. It is a challenging hole where the sand bunkers are as large as a water feature.

If you're looking for a costsaving option for your golf game, the Golf Club is offering season ticket specials this year that will help you get more golf for your money.

Another new special is a Monday family night offer that includes 15 minutes of



free instruction from Golf Pro Chris Jones prior to the family playing nine holes.
