### PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR APPOINTED

City Engineer Chris Trusty, who functioned as the city's interim public works director since February of 2007, has now been officially named public works director, in addition to retaining the city engineer title.

"Chris has been a hard working and highly capable city engineer," City Administrator John Hendrickson said. "He has shown that he has the qualities and qualifications to step up and broaden his responsibilities in this new position."

Prior to joining Eagle Mountain City in October of 2004, Trusty worked for 10 years with private engineering firms in Salt Lake City providing civil engineering services for clients throughout the intermountain area, and before that time served in Logan City as a staff engineer for two years.

"I'm excited to be a part of a team that is going to fulfill the obligations the city has and work to meet the needs of our residents," Trusty said.

Trusty's additional responsibilities as public works director include public works inspections, water, sewer, storm water, streets, parks, recreation, and fleet services.

"We're really pleased to have someone in this position who knows the city and has the respect of the staff," Mayor Heather Jackson said.

Trusty lives in Saratoga Springs with his wife, Veleen, and their three children.

## EM RESIDENTS TO HAVE ACCESS TO FOUR LOCAL LIBRARIES


The cities of Eagle Mountain, Lehi, American Fork, and Pleasant Grove have approved a reciprocal borrowing agreement between their libraries. This cooperative agreement allows patrons holding library cards at any of the four participating libraries to borrow materials from any other participating library.


"Since we have no county-wide library system, there are many area residents who have been asking for an opportunity like this," Eagle Mountain City Librarian Michele Graves said.

Eagle Mountain City Library is participating in the cooperative at a cost of \$35 for residents who want to have access to all four libraries, to equalize the disparity in collection size.

"I appreciate the time and effort that our librarian, Michele Graves, and the other cities' librarians have put into this agreement," Mayor Heather Jackson said. "This will be a great benefit for our residents to have access to a broader collection."

The reciprocal borrowing will begin this spring. An announcement will be made when it is available.

## "TRIPLE THREAT" OF BLACK HAWK, LITTLE TEXAS AND RESTLESS HEART TO PERFORM AT PONY EXPRESS DAYS



LITTLE TEXAS

Country-western artists Black Hawk, Little Texas, and Restless Heart – self-titled as "Triple Threat", will perform at Eagle Mountain City's 11th annual Pony Express Days on Saturday, June 7 at 6:30 PM at the SilverLake Amphitheater (7920 N. SilverLake Parkway). A fireworks display will follow the concert.

"Eagle Mountain City has always strived to provide good, family-friendly entertainment at Pony Express Days," Mayor Heather Jackson said. "We are excited to offer another great concert featuring three very talented and popular groups."

Black Hawk first became successful in the mid-1990s with several top ten hits including "Goodbye Says It All," "Every Once in a While," and "I'm Not Strong Enough to Say No." The trio of Henry Paul (lead vocals, mandolin), Van Stephenson (guitar, vocals), and Dave Robbins (keyboards, vocals), were the founding members. Stephenson died of cancer in 2001 and the group now features Anthony Crawford as its third member.

The quartet of Duane Propes, Porter Howell, Del Gray, and Dwayne O'Brien comprise Little Texas. The successful group also started in the 1990s and has sold over six million albums with hits such as "What Might Have Been," "God Blessed Texas," and "My Love."

Rounding out the triple bill is Restless Heart. Known for hits like "When She Cries," "A Tender Lie," and "Heartbreak Kid," the group first made regular appearances on the country charts from 1985-1994. The original quintet of Larry Stewart (lead vocals), David Innis (keyboards), Greg Jennings (guitar), John Dittrich (drums), and Paul Gregg (bass) recently reunited after taking a break for several years.

Tickets for the concert are \$15 and are on sale now at City Hall, 1650 E. Stagecoach Run, during office hours (Mon.—Thurs. 7:30 AM to 5:30 PM), or at SmithsTix outlets or online at www.smithstix.com. Children ages 2 and under are free. Tickets are expected to sell out, so residents are encouraged to purchase tickets early.

## NATIONAL GUARD RECOGNIZES CITY'S SUPPORT

The Utah National Guard has awarded Eagle Mountain City with a plaque of appreciation for various projects the city has been involved with in support of our local military personnel.

Colonel Jeff Burton and Eagle Mountain residents and National Guard members Sgt. Robert Hill and SFC Roger Wilcox attended the January 8 city council meeting to make the presentation. Burton said the city stands out in our efforts to acknowledge the service of our military men and women.

Eagle Mountain City offers a \$100 per month utilities discount to families who have a member on active duty.

The city is also a sponsor for the Home for a Hero project which is currently in the process of building a new home for SFC Gordon Ewell, an Eagle Mountain resident who is permanently disabled due to his service in Iraq.

In tribute to all those who serve, the city had a "Military Appreciation Week" last May and collected donations for care packages that were sent to the almost 20 members of our community who were serving in Iraq at that time. There are over 100 members of the National Guard that live in Eagle Mountain and others who serve in different branches of the armed forces.

"The city of Eagle Mountain appreciates all of our military members and we plan to continue supporting them," Mayor Heather Jackson said.

## FOR YOUR INFORMATION

**Fencing Requirements** — As many residents decide to put in fencing after buying a home, following is a reminder of general fencing provisions required by the city related to public safety and utilities:

**12.12.3 Fire Hydrants.** Fire hydrants shall not be fenced into a yard. A three (3) foot clear space shall be maintained around the circumference of all fire hydrants as required by the International Fire Code, as amended.

**12.12.5 Utility Boxes.** Utility boxes shall not be fenced into a yard. A three (3) foot clear space shall be maintained around the circumference of all utility boxes.

**12.12.6** Fencing may be installed over a public utility easement, but retaining walls shall not.

**12.12.6 Meters.** Fencing shall not obstruct access to gas and electric meters. If meters are in a fenced area there must be an unlocked entrance to access these meters.

We highly recommend before you begin installing a fence at your home that you call Blue Stakes at 1-800-662-4111 or go online at www.bluestakes.org, so they can check the area for utility lines before you dig.
