COOP'S MARKET BREAKS GROUND

Construction is underway for Eagle Mountain City's first full-service grocery store.

Coop's Market, located at 9362 N. Ranches Parkway, will be a 50,000 square foot store with a bakery, deli, indoor and drive-up pharmacy, an organic food section, a butcherblock meat counter, and a fresh produce section. There will also be a branch of America First Credit Union in the store.


"We are thrilled to see the city's first large-scale grocery store coming to fruition and are grateful that one of our own residents, Phillip Cooper, has made this investment in our community," said Mayor Heather Jackson.

Owned by Phillip Cooper, president of CWC Inc., a new independent grocery store operator in Utah, Coop's Market will be a member of Associated Food Stores, a local grocery cooperative servicing independent retailers in eight western states.

Speaking at the groundbreaking ceremony, Cooper said construction of the store will include the use of energy efficient materials such as solar panels.

The grocery store will occupy about five acres of the 10 acre site. Development Associates Inc. of South Jordan will develop the remaining five acres. Two anchor stores and an inline center are being planned in the same line with Coop's Market.

Construction is expected to be completed by November, 2009. The store will employ between 75-125 people.

Health Care Survey — A health care provider is considering building a medical clinic here in Eagle Mountain. As part of their feasibility study, they have asked the City to collect information concerning residents' current health care situation. We ask that you take a few minutes and fill out the survey on the City's website. Just go to www.eaglemountaincity.com and look for the "Medical Clinic Survey" link.

Landscaping Materials — Please be aware that it is against city code to have landscaping materials (rock, fill dirt, etc) dumped onto City streets. When residents have those materials delivered, it needs to be placed on drive-ways or other private property.

Notes from Our Sheriff's Dept. —

- Remember to lock your cars. We've had a rash of vehicle burglaries. It's recommended to lock your house up also.
- Be careful about giving out any personal information on the phone, even if they know enough about you to sound legitimate.
- Do you have old prescription medications hanging around that you don't know what to do with? Flushing them is no longer the preferred way to dispose of medications. Bring them to the Public Safety building between the hours of 8-5 or call 789-6701, we have a drop box here and they will be disposed of safely.
- Are you interested in taking a part in keeping your neighborhood safe? The Sheriff's Dept. is working hard to get Neighborhood Watch up and running. If you'd like more information, or to volunteer, call Public Safety at 789-6701.
- All dogs are required to be licensed and on leashes at all times. This is a misdemeanor offense and should not be taken lightly.
