EAGLE MOUNTAIN UPDATE

FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

Campaign season is upon us yet again. For the first time in our city's short history we do not need to have a primary election. This is great for us. It shows a sense of stability in our current government. However, I hope that it does not encourage complacency. Please take the time to study the candidates and make what you feel is the best choice in November.

In August we held our first annual Economic Development Summit. This summit was held at the Ranches Golf Course in the form of a

Golf Tournament. It was a great event. We took the opportunity to showcase the city and how we are uniquely positioned for economic development to really start here in Eagle Mountain. We hosted Derek Miller, the director of the Governor's Office of Economic Development. He discussed the new projects that are coming and actually surrounding our city. We are working diligently on landing a large business within this city that will create jobs for the area. This is not a subject that I can speak in depth on, as we are required to keep these negotiations confidential. I can tell you that we are visiting with and sending out information for new businesses to get to know our city. I can also say that those who have come to our city have been impressed with the open feeling, the knowledgeable staff, and the opportunities they have here in Eagle Mountain. I have been involved in every one of those meetings and consider them our highest priority. We will continue to work hard in this endeavor and hope to be able to bring you good news in the future.

Transportation, as always, is an issue that I should update you on. As you can see, the current road construction on Redwood Rd. and S.R. 73 is nearing completion. I have noticed, as I am sure that you all have also noticed, that we lack an additional East bound lane on S.R. 73. The city council and I have made our disappointment, let me rephrase, our outrage about this known. This project was approved and started before I became mayor. I was upset to learn that there was nothing being done for Eagle Mountain's needs on S.R. 73. Unfortunately, there was no way to change this. So I took a new approach, which is to request funding and a project to increase the road capacity to five lanes from Redwood Rd. to Ranches Parkway. That request is in the study phase and hopefully will be funded in the very near future. As Councilmember Cieslak states in every council meeting...please continue to contact your legislators and UDOT about this project. Your support greatly helps push things along.

Lastly, pardon our dust. We are starting the library expansion project. We will be doubling the size of our library (see story on page 6). The library should not be closed during the construction. We will, however need to close off part of the parking lot. Please watch for directions when entering the parking lot. Also, we will be moving the utility drop box out to the road in front of city hall to help accommodate traffic flow during this time. Thank you for your patience! We look forward to the grand opening. Please watch for more information in our next issue.

City Recreation Center Vote Delayed

The Eagle Mountain City Council voted on August 4 to not put a revised proposal for a city recreation center bond on the November ballot.

VCBO Architecture presented an operations cost analysis at the July 21 city council meeting. Their analysis indicated the operations cost of the planned 63,000 square foot recreation center facility (published in the last issue of the Update) would cost \$1.7 million annually, leaving the city with a shortfall of \$800,000 per year.

Following this analysis, the city's Parks and Recreation Board said that they would work on another option to present to the city council. In order to get a bond measure on the November ballot, the council needed to decide on the measure by the August 4 meeting because of state requirements.

The Parks and Recreation Board held emergency meetings to reevaluate the city's options and devised a proposal for a \$6 million aquatics center, similar to the one in Payson. The plan included an outdoor six-lane pool, lazy river, a zero depth area, and other features. There was an option to add a plastic bubble over the six-lane pool at a later date that would add \$300,000 to the cost.

For the revised aquatics center plan, the property tax increase on the ballot would have gone toward construction costs and would have amounted to an approximately \$4 per month increase for a \$200,000 house. The revised operations cost for this center would have amounted to an annual shortfall of about \$66,000 per year for the city. The facility could have opened in the spring of 2010.

Although the council members in attendance on August 4 expressed support for the Parks and Recreation Board's efforts, and a desire to have a city-wide recreation center, they voted to not put the measure on the November ballot due to concerns about the current state of the economy. The council asked the Parks and Recreation Board and city staff to continue investigating options and obtain more feedback from the community, then present the information early next year for consideration of a possible measure on the June 2010 ballot.

The city would like to obtain more feedback from our residents on the aquatics center proposal. Look for opportunities to participate in upcoming surveys on the city website or in the mail. Prior to that, you may send comments to news@emcity.org.

Do You Need a Building Permit? — With the cold season coming, many construction projects move inside. Many people don't realize they need a building permit to finish a part of, or their entire basement, as well as other projects.

A building permit gives you legal permission to start construction on your project. If water or fire, etc., damages your home, homeowners insurance may decline coverage if the source of the damage is attributed to an unpermitted remodel, basement completion, or any other project in which a permit should have been obtained. Should you decide to sell your home, you may not count the square footage of unpermitted living space. Also, home business licenses are only issued for permitted build areas of your home.

If you are considering a home building project, it is best to contact the city's building department if you have questions about whether or not it requires a building permit. Obtaining a permit ensures your construction project is built correctly, will stand the test of time, and hold its value.

- All dogs are required to be licensed through the city and on leashes at all times. This is a misdemeanor offense and should not be taken lightly.


BIKE HELMET SAFETY

CITY NOW OWNS THE RANCHES GOLF CLUB Management Provided by Thanksgiving Point Group

The Eagle Mountain City Council accepted the donation of The Ranches Golf Club to the city on July 21. The Ranches Golf Club was owned by Eagle Mountain Holdings and Eagle Mountain Links, LLC, who offered the city ownership of the golf course property in the form of a donation, free and clear of any fiscal encumbrances. The donation includes other items, such as property and equipment associated with the course, a cash donation of \$650,000, and a Verizon/Cricket cell tower lease.

The city council at the same meeting approved a management agreement with Vanguard Golf Management Group. Vanguard also manages the Thanksgiving Point golf course and the Sand Hollow golf course in St. George.

"The Ranches is one of the most unique courses in the state, encompassing rolling fairways, native fescue, and a Links layout only found in the best courses in Europe" said Mark Whetzel, CEO-PGA Director of Golf of Vanguard Golf Management. "We are anxious to implement player services and customer service programs only found at high end resorts and country clubs."

Changes are already underway, as The Ranches Golf Club is now offering discounted rates for local residents (including Saratoga Springs and Lehi), along with the existing military, junior, and senior discounts. The restaurant at the golf club has been reopened as The Ranches Grill and offers breakfast items, sandwiches, grill favorites, salads, and appetizers with prices from \$4 to \$7.

Library Expansion Project — Construction has begun on the library expansion. The expansion will provide additional space for computer workstations and a Children's collection and story time area. \$96,000 in grant money will be used to provide additional library materials.

The library, which celebrates its tenth anniversary in November, began in a 12-foot by 12-foot room in the fire station. It moved from there to a 640-square-foot trailer, and then to the City Hall building. The expansion will add approximately 2,500 square feet.

"The library staff and I are very excited to have the city's support in helping us grow," said Michele Graves, librarian. "As a young library we have made great strides, and with this addition, will continue to do so."

The library received a \$95,000 grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), and a \$1,000 grant from Target.

"In planning this library expansion, we have remained fiscally responsible by making this an in-house project and using the grant money we received to provide the additional materials," said Mayor Heather Jackson. "I commend our librarian, Michele Graves, for the tremendous job she has done overseeing our library."

The city's building department, working as contractor on the project, is saving the city approximately \$75,000.

Recommended Plant List — A list of plants, trees, shrubs, grasses, etc that is recommended for our climate is located on the city website on the planning department page.

Solicitors Policy — People are only allowed to solicit in Eagle Mountain once they have received a permit from the city. The permitted solicitors will be issued a photo ID badge that must be worn while soliciting. Please feel free to contact the Planning Department if an unlicensed solicitor comes to your residence.

Garbage Cans — Please keep in mind that garbage cans should not be put out for pick up any earlier than the evening before pick up time and cans should be removed from the curb as soon as possible after pick-up to avoid being cited.

Recycling Dumpster — Those who are using the recycling dumpster located at the public works building, please remember that the dumpster is for recyclable items only. Mattresses and furniture should not be left outside of the dumpster. No glass or Styrofoam is allowed, and cardboard must be broken down flat.
