THIS YEAR, OUR FOCUS IS ON LANDING A DEAL WITH A MAJOR COMPANY TO LOCATE IN EAGLE MOUNTAIN.


I'd like you to know what we are doing to accomplish this lofty goal.

First of all, we've identified our strengths and have been meeting with companies who are looking to expand or relocate. We have met with several companies, and they have been impressed by what they've seen and what we have to offer.

Because of the good feedback we've received from these meetings, we realized that we needed to find a way to shout that message out to the world. We decided to embark on new territory by launching a major marketing campaign for our city. - 3. Attract new commercial, industrial and small business residents to Eagle Mountain.
- 4. Attract new homeowners to Eagle Mountain.
- 5. Evolve the Eagle Mountain brand to illustrate future potential while embracing the past history of the area and community.

We are attacking these goals head on and together with Kassing Andrews have decided to use the following economic development based initiatives. We have a new economic development kit. We've changed

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our logo. We have a corporate video that provides an overview of what we have to offer businesses. You will see billboards and commercials. We will be giving our website a facelift. Notice the new format and name for our newsletter. We are also aggressively working to get our message out to the national media.

Our slogan is "Find yourself in Eagle Mountain." The campaign is mainly promoting the unique qualities of the city. We have open and secluded space at a good price, an educated populace (90% of the population have college experience), we are close to an international airport, and three universities are within 30 miles of us. 

UDOT Number to Report Drifting Snow — A satellite maintenance shed has been established by UDOT near the crossroads in Saratoga Springs. Snow plows and personnel are stationed there during the winter to increase response time for snow removal on SR-73 and SR-68.

This number should only be used to report snow accumulation problems and not other road issues.

UTAH CO. SHERIFF'S ITEMS

Remember that by city ordinance, to assist with snow removal, you cannot park vehicles or trailers on city streets between

the hours of 4 AM to 4 PM whenever it snows two or more inches.

Always keep vehicles off city streets whenever possible to enable emergency vehicles full access to the roads.

- With winter weather here, make sure you are prepared. Give yourself extra time as you travel, and allow plenty of room between yourself and the vehicle in front of you.
- Please keep children seat-belted, and in car seats if required, at all times. Short distances are no excuse when it comes to the safety of our children. Most accidents happen close to home. Also, remember children should not ride in the front seat if you have passenger side airbags.
- To combat theft and vandalism, keep your car doors locked and make sure you don't keep valuables in your vehicle, especially overnight. Also, keep your garage door shut whenever possible.
- If you are interested in being part of keeping your neighborhood safe, now is the time to get involved. The sheriff's department is working to get the whole city actively participating in Neighborhood Watch. For information about Neighborhood Watch, call the Public Safety office at 789-6701.

CITY RECEIVES GRANT FOR PONY EXPRESS STATUE

Eagle Mountain City was awarded a \$25,000 arts and cultural grant by Utah County on February 1. The grant was given to the City specifically for a proposed sculpture project to honor the 150th anniversary of the Pony Express, to be celebrated in June of 2010. The grant may not be used for another purpose.

The City has commissioned Utah artist Deon Duncan to create an original sculpture depicting a young pony express rider taking the Pony Express oath while standing next to his horse. The grant will cover the cost of creating the design and a quarter life-sized hydrostone sculpture, pedestal, and plaque, which will be placed at City Hall. This sculpture will be the model for a potential larger than life-sized bronze sculpture that the city may commission if sufficient additional funds are raised.

Other future plans for the project include pursuing a program involving our local schools that would allow Duncan, a former art teacher, to demonstrate to school children the process of creating a sculpture.
