FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

COUNCIL MEMBER ERIC
CIESLAK RESIGNED FROM THE
CITY COUNCIL EFFECTIVE
AUGUST 17. I WANTED TO
SHARE WITH YOU THE
FOLLOWING COMMENTS,
WHICH HE MADE AT HIS LAST
CITY COUNCIL MEETING. HE
WILL BE GREATLY MISSED.

I was elected in 2007 to the City Council of this wonderful community. This has been an opportunity that has been enjoyable and very rewarding. We have been able to virtually eliminate all negative publicity regarding the city and launched a campaign to promote what is good in the city. As a result of this, we are receiving an unprecedented number of inquiries from business seeking to "find 'themselves' in Eagle Mountain". We have striven to improve our transportation situation by finishing Porter's Crossing, working diligently with our neighboring communities to finish Pony Express parkway and secure funding for the expansion of SR-73. We have worked with all relevant stakeholders to ensure we have adequate transportation corridors to handle the growth that is certain to come in the future. We have done this with a firm commitment to maintaining our identity as a city.

In addition to our accomplishments in the transportation area, we have been able to see the completion of several initiatives that will satisfy basic needs of a community: we opened the new 1.2 MGD wastewater treatment plant



and we have two new wells supplying the city with culinary and land-scaping water. Speaking of water, we recently adopted new watering initiatives that promote water conservation. As a member of the City Council, I have been impressed with the commitment of the city staff to making our lives, as residents of Eagle Mountain, as good as possible (in most cases, this means allowing us to exercise our rights as Americans and in those cases where they need to step in, they do so in a professional and courteous manner).

We have promoted the city as environmentally conscious. We have done so by making recycling available for those who wish to do so (even negotiating the ability to opt-out for those who may not want to do it after trying it initially). We have enacted renewable energy policies that allow residents to sell unused energy from their solar panels and/or wind turbines to the city. In addition to these measures, we have endeavored to educate the city on the importance of conserving water and have adopted a tiered water rate and watering guidelines to promote this.

During my time on the council I have had the privilege to work with other members of the council who are committed to making this city as good as possible. While we have not agreed on every vote, we have been able to avoid a usual pratfall of those serving in elected offices: uncivil behavior to those with a differing opinion. I have been a tireless advocate of the need to debate issues in a civil manner. I am convinced the better we are at civilly expressing disagreements the better off we will be in all facets of our life, be it at home, in the workplace, or in the community. It is not OK to let your anger/ irritation/frustration override common decency when discussing needs within the community. Persistent determination goes a lot further than yelling louder when espousing a particular cause. I hope that during my time on the council I have been an example of this point.

For the last nine months, I have been unemployed. Recently, I was able to join the ranks of the employed once again. While I am grateful and happy to be working again, it is tempered by the fact the job I have been offered (and accepted) is relocating me and my family to Chicago. As a result, I will be resigning my position on the council effective August 17, 2010. I will always be grateful for the trust placed in me by the voters of Eagle Mountain when they elected me.

This has been a very difficult decision to make, because I feel responsible to the citizens of Eagle Mountain to carry out the term I was elected to. I am comforted in the fact we have a City Council, a Mayor, and an exceptional city staff who are all committed to making this city the best it can be. I will always be grateful for the privilege it has been to work alongside such fine individuals as I believe you all to be. Upon reflection, I can truly say "I found myself in Eagle Mountain".

Aquatic Center Public Hearing — Eagle Mountain City Council will hold a public hearing at 7 PM on September 21, 2010 in the Eagle Mountain City Council Chambers to receive input from the public with respect to the issuance of General Obligation Bonds for a recreation facility. This item will be included on the ballot at the November 2, 2010 General Election.

SEPTEMBER 9 IS FETAL ALCOHOL AWARENESS DAY

At the city council meeting on August 17, Mayor Jackson and the city council signed a proclamation declaring September 9, 2010 as Fetal Alcohol Awareness Day in Eagle Mountain, in support of the internationally recognized day.

Fetal Alcohol Awareness is a cause close to the heart of Eagle Mountain residents Terra and Jeremy Daniel and their family. Their daughter Briar was diagnosed with Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder at one year of age. Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder is caused when a woman drinks alcohol while pregnant, causing irreversible brain damage to her unborn baby.

The Daniels became aware Briar wasn't developing as she should at about 11 months and looked into the health history provided by Briar's birth mother. They discovered she admitted to drinking alcohol daily for the first five months of gestation.

"We will be eternally grateful (her birth mother)... not only had the unconditional love to place Briar with our family, but that she had the courage to be honest in her health history," Terra Daniel says.

Now age four, Briar is developmentally more like a two year old. It took years of physical therapy to teach her to run and climb. She is now learning how to jump. She is also undergoing speech therapy.

One of the more challenging aspects of FASD is managing Briar's emotional reactions. She is prone to frequent "meltdown" tantrums. According to Terra, too many people, too many noises, or changes to their normal routine may or may not cause a meltdown. The Daniels do all they can to

help her with consistency and provide an environment that won't over stimulate her.

These accommodations don't keep them from enjoying typical family activities. Terra Daniel says Briar loves to

swim, play in the park, and walk the dog.

Although raising a child with FASD can be a struggle, Terra Daniel says, "Briar has taught us patience, compassion, and the importance of celebrating even the smallest successes."

Wanting to do all they can to help spread awareness of the disorder, the Daniels will be participating in a statewide campaign that will include Mrs. Utah Ashalon Goodrich.

"FASD is a disability that is 100% preventable," Terra Daniels says. "That is why we feel so passionate about sharing our story."

FETAL ALCOHOL SPECTRUM DISORDER **QUICK FACTS**

- FASD is the leading known preventable cause of mental retardation and birth defects, and a leading known cause of learning disabilities.
- FASD annual births are higher than autism, Down syndrome, cerebral palsy, cystic fibrosis, spina bifida and sudden infant death syndrome - COMBINED.
- FASD prevention is at least ten-times more cost effective than the \$1.4 million lifetime cost to treat one person with Fetal Alcohol Syndrome.


