FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

ON SEPTEMBER 7 THE CITY COUNCIL APPOINTED JON CELAYA TO COMPLETE ERIC CIESLAK'S TERM (THROUGH DECEMBER 2011).

Mr. Celaya has lived in Eagle Mountain for almost six years. Previously, he was a member of the city's economic development board. He has also served on The Ranches HOA Board of Directors for nearly six years and is currently a Republican Party Precinct Chair. He participated in his first full meeting as a city council member on September 21.

The 2010 General Election will be held on November 2. Polls will be open from 7 AM to 8 PM.

Precincts 2 and 4, City Hall; Precincts 5 and 6, Pony Express Elementary School. If you are unsure which precinct your address is in, please visit the city website.

This year's election will be administered by the Utah County Elections Office. Information is available at 801-851-8128 or www.utahcountyonline.com/Dept/ClerkAud/Elections.

Voters must be registered no later than 30 days before the election and may register by mail or in person at the County Elections Office, 100 E. Center, Room 3100. Overseas absentee ballots must be received by the County Elections Office no later than October 13.

Story Time — The library is offering story time through Thursday, November 11.

11-11:30 AM. Thursday sessions will be from 1-1:30 PM. The format will be the same for each weekly session so patrons are asked to choose one day. There is no cost to participate and no registration required.

Library Cards Mandatory — Beginning January 2011, all patrons MUST have their library card with them when they come to the library to check out. We will no longer be able to check out items without a library card. If a patron has lost/misplaced their card, a replacement card can be purchased for \$3. There will be NO exceptions to the new rule. We appreciate everyone's cooperation in this matter.

Self Check-Out — The library's new self-checkout machine is now up and running. This will help alleviate the wait time during our busy times. A library card is required to use the machine and a staff member will be happy to show you how it works.

Alpine District Offers Programs for Disabled

Persons — The Alpine School District Department of Special Education is attempting to contact persons with disabilities between the ages of birth and twenty-one in compliance with the Federal law, which mandates the provision of free educational programs and/or services for such persons.

If a child is having significant difficulty with vision, hearing, speech, behavior, is experiencing slow development untypical for his/her age, physical impairments, or learning difficulty, he/she may be a child with a disability.

If you know of any child whom you feel might qualify for these services, including students suspected of having a disability even though they are advancing from grade to grade, in a private school, homeless, or migrant, please contact the principal of your school or the Special Education office of Alpine School District at 801-610-8410.

If you are the parent of a child with an IEP enrolled in a public school, we are required by Utah Code Section 53A-1a-704(10) to inform you of the availability of a scholarship to attend a private school through the Carson Smith Scholarship Program. EM FIRE Department

Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Classes

Offered — EMFD will be offering CERT classes at Fire Station # 2 in the Ranches. Classes include topics such as Emergency Preparedness, Fire Suppression and Safety, First Aid and Disaster Triage, CPR, Search and Rescue, Terrorism, and Disaster Psychology. There is approximately 21 hours of training, with a simulated disaster drill to finish the class.

The next class will start on October 26 at 7 PM, and will run Tuesday and Thursday evenings for four weeks. Another class will be offered on Saturdays starting Nov 6 and will be from 8 AM – 5 PM on Nov 6 and 13, with the disaster drill on Nov 20 from 9 AM -12 PM. We need at least 10 people in each class or they will be canceled.

Cost is \$20 for the series of classes. A CERT backpack with safety equipment including a helmet, vest, gloves and other accessories is available to purchase for \$42. Purpose of the General Obligation Referendum

Eagle Mountain City, Utah County, Utah is asking qualified voters to consider the authorization to issue General Obligation Bonds to finance the construction of a new aquatic center.

The Bonds will be backed by the property taxes collected by the City. This security provides the lowest cost financing option available to municipal government.

On November 2, 2010 voters have the opportunity to approve the financing, authorizing up to \$7 million, which may or may not be 100% used pending final construction costs.
