Winter Preparedness — With winter weather here, make sure you're prepared. Give yourself extra time as you travel and allow plenty of room between yourself and the vehicle in front of you. Have emergency plans in place. Many of us have experienced being cut off from our families and not being able to return home because of bad weather. Make sure you have food and water in your vehicles. Also, have alternate plans in place to care for all family members in the event you are unable to return home when expected.

Snow Plows — Remember that by city ordinance, to assist with snow removal, you cannot park vehicles or trailers on city streets between the hours of 4:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. whenever it snows two or more inches.

Safe Disposal of Medications — Do you have old prescription medications hanging around that you don't know what to do with? Flushing them is no longer the preferred way to dispose of medications. Bring them to the Public Safety building during city business hours or call 789-6701, we have a drop box here and they will be disposed of safely.

Community Safety Program — If you are interested in taking part in keeping your neighborhood safe, now is the time to get involved. The Sheriff's Office is working hard to get all of our city actively participating in our Community Safety Program. Ham Radio Operators and Trainees Wanted — Under the direction of the City of Eagle Mountain and Fire Chief Andrus, a new emergency communications resource is being developed to aid the City and its residents during an emergency. The Eagle Mountain Emergency Communications Team (EMECT) will provide critical communications support to the Fire Department and the City during *some* minor and *all* major emergencies.

The EMECT will utilize amateur (ham) radio with the aid of licensed amateur radio operators who live within the city limits. Two amateur radio repeaters have already been put on the air and can be utilized for excellent coverage of both the City Center and The Ranches. Additionally, those who sign up for the EMECT will be trained in simplex (radio-toradio) communications, repeater(radio-to-repeater-to radio) or duplex operations during an emergency, message handling, and other related subjects. Training will be provided by the Eagle Mountain Fire Department.

Individuals who volunteer to participate in EMECT will be assigned to critical responsibilities throughout the city. Some of those assignments will involve the city's key

personnel, the Emergency Operations Center (EOC), the City's Fire Stations, and other locations as required.



Community Emergency Response Team (C.E.R.T) members would be a great asset to the team. We'll also be training new amateur radio operators, for anyone who is interested in learning. - The newest compact fluorescent light bulbs are small enough to slip into a holiday stocking. The bulbs outperform older versions of fluorescent lamps, and they save tons of energy over their long lifetime.
- If you're buying a battery-powered present, include rechargeable batteries. If the gift requires standard batteries, let the recipient know where to recycle them.
- Give your time instead of purchasing a store-bought gift. Offer to babysit, work in the yard or cook dinner. Loved ones will be touched by your consideration, and the gift will save money and energy.
- Wrap your gifts in reusable bags and yesterday's newspaper. Glam them up a bit with hand-drawn greetings. The paper can later be used as packing material.

COUNTRY MUSIC SUPERSTAR CLINT BLACK TO HEADLINE PONY EXPRESS DAYS 2011 CONCERT

Country music superstar Clint Black will headline the annual Pony Express Days Concert and Fireworks at SilverLake Amphitheater in Eagle Mountain City on Saturday, June 4, 2011. Tickets are on sale now online at www.eaglemountaincity.com. Ticket prices are \$15. Children ages 2 and under are free. Tickets will also be available for purchase in person at City Hall starting in January.

Clint Black has sold over 20 million albums worldwide since his 1989 debut "Killin' Time" spawned an unprecedented five #1 hits and went triple platinum. Since then, Black has had nearly two dozen #1 hit singles, including "Like the Rain" and "A Better Man," and almost as many Top 5 and Top 10 hits – all of them his original compositions.

Beyond his musical career, Black has appeared as an actor in several films, including "Maverick" with Mel Gibson and Jodie Foster, and the upcoming "Flicka 2." He recently appeared on Donald Trump's hit reality TV series "Celebrity Apprentice." He is also involved with various charity

foundations, including serving as Honorary Chair of the International Rett Syndrome Foundation's (IRSF) "Research to Reality: Funding Progress" campaign, which helps to accelerate treatments and research to find a cure for the developmental disorder.
