FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

WELCOME NEW CITIZENS OF EAGLE MOUNTAIN. WE WOULD LIKE TO FORMALLY WELCOME THE RESIDENTS OF WHITE HILLS TO OUR CITY.

After more than a year since the council's approval of an annexation of about 3,000 acres in the Pole Canyon area, the Lieutenant Governor's office approved the annexation. We have added 123 residences and approximately 400 people to our city. This brings our population to about 23,000. Pole Canyon is a master-planned development by DAI that includes about 2,000 acres zoned for residential, about 650 acres for commercial and industrial, and 178 acres for parks and open space. The plan also includes space for future schools, churches, and public safety facilities.

We have all patiently, well some of us not so patiently, waited for the widening of S.R. 73. I have some news. UDOT is going out to bid and should have a contractor selected by the end of February. We expect to see construction commence no later than April. The project should be completed by September. There will be several changes. First, you will see another new traffic light in the next couple of weeks. This light will be at 800 West in Saratoga Springs. When the widening project is complete you will be driving on new pavement and there will be five lanes. We will also have two left turn lanes from Westbound S.R. 73 to Ranches Pkwy. There will be additional snow fencing along S.R. 73 as well. UDOT has seen the effective nature of the snow fencing they put in and are going to give us more. We are very excited for this project. We will keep you posted as we know more about dates and lane closures.

Great things are happening in our region. I recently attended the groundbreaking ceremony for the new NSA facility known as the Utah Data Center. This is a

great opportunity for our city to have a facility like this so close to us. We are looking forward to the many other opportunities that will occur because of this facility.

We continue to focus on economic development and are excited to get our Business Incubator Development Program going. We have received several applications for the program and are currently going through those applications to see which companies qualify and are best suited to the program. We hope to have the space finished soon so that we can have these companies occupy the property. We are glad to see a vacant building filling up. We continue to work on several other leads and will be working on some needed infrastructure items to be able to attract good partners to Eagle Mountain.

Snow Parking — Remember that by city ordinance 10.10.030, to assist with snow removal, you cannot park vehicles or trailers on city streets between the hours of 4:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. whenever it snows two or more inches.

Semi Parking — Semi trailers are not allowed to be parked in non-designated areas for more than two hours.

Old Medications — Do you have old prescription medications hanging around that you don't know what to do with? Flushing them is no longer the preferred way to dispose of medications. Bring them to the Public Safety building during city business hours or call 789-6701, we have a drop box here and they will be disposed of safely.

Community Safety Program — The City of Eagle Mountain is working with the Utah County Sheriff's Office to get all neighborhoods participating in the Community Safety Program. This is a program that helps to locate missing children, teach about preparing for emergencies, being first responders, notifying and helping during disasters, and watching out for our neighbors. 

Closure — The library will be closed Saturday, February 19 due to a required software upgrade. We will reopen on Tuesday, February 22 after the President's Day holiday.





ize and overlay on Porter's Crossing from Smith Ranch Road to Golden Eagle Road. We will also be doing a pulverize and overlay for Ranches Parkway from Grant Street to James Street, as well as full depth reconstruction from Pony Express Parkway to Peregrine Rd. A chip seal will be placed on Eagle Mountain Boulevard from SR 73 to Sweetwater Road.

We will continue patching potholes along Pony Express Parkway from Red Hawk Ranch Road to Smith Ranch Road. After the patching has been installed, we will likely place a fog coat or slurry seal. We will be conducting asphalt rejuvenation on specific areas throughout the Cedar Pass Ranch subdivision. The City will also continue with the crack sealing and patching maintenance throughout the City. We are also planning a left turn lane from Pony Express Parkway westbound onto SilverLake Parkway.

Please drive carefully as we take care of these repairs. We appreciate your patience.

Miss EM Teaches Kids About Bullying

Hartley Lojik, Miss Eagle Mountain, presented an assembly for the 5th graders at Pony Express Elementary entitled, "Take a Stand, Lend a Hand, STOP BULLYING NOW." She asked the students various questions pertaining to bullying, such as, "Are you being bullied?", "Are you a bully?", "Who can you talked to if you are being bullied?", etc. She also asked the students why they think bullies act the way they do and how can they avoid confrontation with bullies.

One of the activities at the assembly was to gather two groups of 10 kids each. They linked arms and formed a circle. She then told two additional students to do everything possible to break the circle and get in their designated groups. The two students tried with all they power to get in the group but the circle of 10 kids kept them out.

The moral of this activity was interesting. At no time did Lojik tell the group to keep them out. They did that on their own accord. Lojik went on to explain how we are often inclined to not let people in because they look, act or talk differently than us. It was a great presentation and the group of about 180 students learned a lot.

Snow Removal

Eagle Mountain City handles snow removal on city streets. The Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) handles snow removal on SR-73 and SR-68 (Redwood Road).

The City strives to maintain safe traction for vehicles. Due to the high cost in snow and ice removal, dry pavement should not be expected on all streets in all storms. Eagle Mountain City has five snow plow trucks with salt spreaders. Streets are plowed in order of priority.

PRIORITY 1 – Arterials roads (Eagle Mountain Blvd, Ranches Parkway, Pony Express Parkway, and Sweetwater Road)

PRIORITY 2 - Collector roads, school zones, hills and curves

PRIORITY 3 – Residential, alleyways, cul-de-sacs

PRIORITY 4 - Unimproved roads

Home owners are responsible for snow and ice removal on sidewalks and driveways. No snow or ice should be removed from private property onto roadways.

The street plowing process may create a build-up of snow in front of driveways. It would be neither cost nor time effective for city snow plow drivers to stop and clear this build-up in front of driveways. We ask for the understanding and cooperation of home owners with this.
