FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

EAGLE MOUNTAIN IS THE THIRD LARGEST CITY IN UTAH IN TERMS OF LAND MASS AT AROUND 53 SQUARE MILES. THE CITY IS APPROXIMATELY LESS THAN 25% DEVELOPED, LEAVING MILES OF UNDEVELOPED LAND IN THE CITY FOR RESIDENTS TO ENJOY.

It is the beautiful landscape, the rural feel, and great views of Utah Lake and surrounding mountain ranges that attracted many of us to Eagle Mountain. These undeveloped lands are jewels waiting to be discovered, but most of these lands are not owned by the City, but by Federal, State, or private agencies. Since May 2000, Eagle Mountain has prohibited the use of off-highway vehicles on City streets, which displaced OHV activity to undeveloped land. Due to this displacement, the City has noticed a steady increase of illegal and unwanted OHV trails within the last decade, along with an increase in trespassing, hunting, dumping, and other nuisance issues on these lands.

In an effort to preserve these scenic lands, the City has teamed up with federal, state, and private agencies to engineer a managed OHV trail system that would legalize certain trails/routes for residents to enjoy while protecting the land. We have been working closely with these land agencies to approve designated trails/routes through their property. We have garnered several trail easements and aim to lay out trail markers and kiosks to properly direct and educate riders. We have submitted an OHV grant which will help the City provide signage for the trails. This OHV trail system would create a network of routes that connect our City to surrounding communities (Cedar Fort, Fairfield, and Saratoga Springs) and nearby trail systems such as: Five-Mile Pass, Manning Canyon, Soldier Pass, Israel Canyon, the summit

of Lake Mountain, and more.

Last year, we conducted an OHV Survey online to receive public input. After getting a sufficient sample size, 88% of respondents were open to allowing limited OHV use on designated City streets. Following these results, and after months of researching with other cities and police departments, a new off-highway vehicle ordinance was approved by the City Council to be effective July 1, 2012 (see info on pg. 2). I would ask that our citizens protect their privilege and be responsible with OHV use, as the right to ride on City streets could be revoked at anytime.

City Council Approves New OHV Ordinance

As mentioned by Mayor Jackson on page one, the City Council recently approved a new off-highway vehicles ordinance for the City. Following is an outline of the ordinance.

The City's OHV ordinance states:

- Off-Highway Vehicles
 - The only OHVs allowed on City streets are 3 types: (UT Code 41-22-2)
 - All-Terrain Type I (ATV)
 - All-Terrain Type II (Side-by-side)
 - Motorcycle (Dirt bike)
- Streets
 - All City streets are open to limited OHVs except:
 - Pony Express Parkway
 - Ranches Parkway
 - SR-73
 - Eagle Mountain Boulevard (east of the roundabout/flagpole)
 - OHVs shall not be operated on paved public trails or sidewalks
 - Streets are only open to allow OHV operators to gain direct access to or from designated areas and trails
 - o Lawful Crossing of Excluded Public Streets (see OHV Crossings Map)
 - An operator of an OHV may only cross excluded public streets or highways at City assigned crossings
 - When crossing, the OHV must come to a complete stop, proceed only after yielding the right of way to oncoming traffic, and proceed at a right angle across to the other side.
- Speed
 - o All OHVs must not exceed 20 miles per hour on City streets
- Age Requirements
 - o OHV operators must be at least 16 and have a valid driver's license
 - o A person 16 or 17 of years old must wear a DOT approved helmet
- Legal Requirements
 - All OHVs must be registered under the current year and should be in a plainly visible position and a registration card shall be kept with the vehicle and shall be available for a law enforcement officer (Utah Code 41-22-3)
- Equipment Requirement (Utah Code 41-22-10.7)
 - OHVs do not need to meet street-legal requirement
 - OHVs must be equipped with
 - Functional brakes
 - A noise control device conforming to U.S. Forest Services standards
 - Working headlights and taillights when operated between sunrise and sunset

Volunteers Aid Sheriff's Department

A new partnership between the Utah County Sheriff's Department (UCSD) and the City was announced at the City Council meeting on May 15. The Volunteers in Police Service (VIPS) program enlists citizens who provide support for the UCSD.

VIPS duties include vacation patrols, assisting with the Community Safety Program, helping stranded motorists, assisting deputies with vehicle impounds, and directing traffic during events or road closures/emergencies.

UCSD Sgt. Jeff Jones introduced the current members of VIPS at the council meeting, saying, "All are dedicated to their family and community." Following is some background on the volunteers:

Josh Rich is a Paramedic for the American Fork Fire Department. He brings a wealth of experience in emergency operations and runs a business outfitting emergency vehicles. He has lived in the city for four years.

Chris Trainor is the Sr. Art Director for Ancestry.com. He designed the door hanger notice for the Sheriff's office and is a local Scoutmaster. He has lived in the city for five years.

Kirk Flora is the Owner of Kirk Flora's Taekwondo Institute. He is a Fifth Degree Black Belt, World Taekwondo Federation and Software Engineer. He has lived in Eagle Mountain for over seven years.

Primary Election

The primary election is scheduled for June 26, 2012. Polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. You may now register to vote online if you have a current Utah Driver's License or State ID Card. Eagle Mountain City Watering Ordinance

Previously, there were assigned days of the week for watering your lawn, according to your address. Now, there are no longer specific days assigned for watering, although the ordinance still specifies no watering is allowed between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. The City encourages use of good water conservation techniques – one of which is to water every three days. Please check your sprinkler system clocks to make sure they are set appropriately. Also, inspect sprinkler heads to be sure they are functioning properly.

Metal Dumpster

A privately owned metal dumpster has been placed outside the public works building (2545 N. Pony Express Pkwy). Feel free to dump all types of metal, and the following: radiators, batteries, metal swing sets, vehicles (with titles), exercise equipment, windows & doors, hot water heaters, mowers, washers/dryers, furnaces, computers, appliances, metal tubs, bikes, BBQs, power cords, etc. We ask that you do not put other trash in this dumpster. 
