FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

EVEN NOW AS I SIT DOWN TO WRITE THIS ARTICLE I FIND IT DIFFICULT TO ARTICULATE MY THOUGHTS AND FEELINGS INTO WORDS. THE LAST COUPLE OF WEEKS IN EAGLE MOUNTAIN HAVE BEEN CHALLENGING, TO SAY THE LEAST.

We had a major fire threaten our borders, actually two within one week. The first burned approximately 300 acres in the southeast section of our city. The second burned over 5,500 acres and threatened homes and families along Lake Mountain.

First, I would like to express my thanks. That thanks goes to our firefighters and all of the fire personnel that were brought in to help contain this fire. We had local engines from Syracuse to Payson helping. Next, I have to thank the Utah County Sheriff's Office, our very own Eagle Mountain Division as well as all of the other support we received. There were at least 39 officers out here working with us during the fire. I would like to thank the residents of Eagle Mountain. I really do mean all of you. Those who were evacuated did so in an orderly fashion and were easy to work with. We appreciate your cooperation. It is much easier for fire personnel to defend your homes when they know that you are safe. I would like to thank those who volunteered — our CERT team and our firefighters association (the spouses) who organized the numerous donations and made sure those who were working got fed. Thank you to the many others who donated their time — helping evacuate animals from the local animal sanctuary, cataloguing donations, serving the staff. Walmart, Home Depot, Chik-fil-A, KFC, Del Taco, and other corporations made donations, but there were a substantial number of community donations as well, like the five children who emptied their piggy banks to make sure that our firefighters had good healthy food to eat. We're also grateful to those of you who made cards, letters, and posters—giving little boosts of support. I'm sure I've left someone out because the community response was so overwhelming. Please know that no act of service went unnoticed.

I cannot remember a time during the last 4 ½ years when I have been more honored to say that I am the mayor of Eagle Mountain City. You have shown the rest of the state what I already knew, that Eagle Mountain is the most desirable place to live, and it is because of the people who live here, the people who pull themselves up by their bootstraps, roll up their sleeves and get to work— especially when it seems the hardest time to do so. It is truly a privilege to be elected by you and to represent you to the rest of our county, state, etc.

Now, I must give some words of caution. Both of the fires that ravaged Eagle Mountain were started by humans, both by target shooting. Please be careful when you go shooting. Don't fire weapons when Camp Williams is not willing to fire. When it is a red flag burn day no one should fire weapons. We are in drought conditions and need to recognize that. I am not saying that you should not enjoy your right to bear arms. I am saying to please use caution and common sense when discharging a firearm. Do so legally and safely.

Beyond the fire, there are several other significant things that have happened in the past month. First, our long time city attorney Gerald Kinghorn lost his battle with cancer at the end of May. We wish his family peace. Jerry was the institutional knowledge in our city and will be greatly missed. He served our community from October 1997 – May 2012. We are currently undergoing a process of appointing a new city attorney and hope to have that completed this month.

Second, our planning commission chair, Tom Maher sold his home and, much to my regret, moved outside the city limits of Eagle Mountain. Tom served on the planning commission for eleven years. His knowledge of our development code and the housing market are irreplaceable. We wish him well. He said that he wanted to downsize and live closer to his children and grandchildren. I cannot fault him for that. Tom, we wish you great happiness in your future and thank you for so many years of service. We have appointed Wendy Komoroski to fill the vacancy on the planning commission. We are excited to have her knowledge and experience to add to our planning commission.

Finally, we need to bid farewell to John Hendrickson, our City Administrator. John is retiring from service after working in the field of city management for over 38 years. John has been with the City since March of 2007. He has brought great wisdom and a steady hand to our city. He spent much of his time here mentoring and training his replacement, Ifo Pili. We thank him for his watchful eye and constant care and wish him well on his next endeavor...a mission. John and his lovely wife Janean will be

headed to Morristown, NJ to serve a mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Ifo Pili will be taking the reins as our new City Administrator. We are very excited to have Ifo assume this role. The council and I are confident that we are in good hands and look forward to the next chapter in Eagle Mountain.

Enjoy the rest of the summer and please be careful with fireworks, firearms, and anything else that can cause a fire.

Fireworks Restrictions

Due to the high wildfire danger this year, more extensive fireworks restrictions have been given within Eagle Mountain City (see info and map on pg. 5).

Consumer fireworks are a wonderful way to celebrate holidays. But they must be used carefully! Following is information from the National Council on Fireworks Safety:

Before: Choose an open area away from spectators, homes, and buildings and dry vegetation. Use a garden hose to wet down the area before firing.

During: As each device burns out, soak it using a hose, or bucket of water.

After: Place all used items in a covered fireproof container and leave it outside and away from homes and buildings.

Eagle Mountain City is providing the following alternate locations for residents in banned areas to light fireworks:

Pony Express Rodeo Arena parking lot (4447 Major Street)

Smith Ranch Park parking lot (3885 E. Smith Ranch Road)

SilverLake Amphitheater parking lot (7920 N. SilverLake Pkwy).

You may use paved areas only at these parks, and we ask residents to properly extinguish and clean-up fireworks after use.

City Administrator John Hendrickson Retires

After 38 years of managing cities, John Hendrickson, Eagle Mountain's city administrator since 2007, has decided to embrace retirement. But, he won't have much time to lounge poolside or improve his golf swing. He and his wife Janean are leaving Utah in August to serve a mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints in Morristown, NJ.

The Eagle's View recently spoke with Hendrickson about his experience with Eagle Mountain and what lies ahead.

Eagle's View: What is the biggest improvement in the City since you started here?

John Hendrickson: There's been substantial improvement with the infrastructure. The city can now double in size, allowing growth to occur naturally. Roads and parks improvements have helped the city become a full-fledged, more fully-functioning community. The image issues have been resolved. The quality and professionalism of staff and elected officials has improved and matured.

EV: What have been your most fulfilling projects?

JH: Our purchase from Rocky Mountain Power, the CWP water project, earning an A+ rating on the budget during difficult economic times, and the evolution of Pony Express Days to the level it is now with the budget improvements made this year.

EV: How has your time in EM helped you grow or

change personally?

JH: I've become a lot more satisfied with my career choice. I learned how to delegate more and rely on the staff because I had capable people to provide support. My wife said it's been nice to see me come home happy.

EV: How do you feel about the community?

JH: I love the youth and vibrancy here, the acceptance of so many different people. It's very warm. The surroundings are beautiful, with the unique terrain, the outdoor amenities and trails.

EV: What do you hope for the future of EM?

JH: I hope it realizes its dreams, potential, to get a substantial amount of industry, followed by commercial, continued good leadership, people who are looking out for the best interests of the City. If the elected officials remain steady, I believe the City will achieve its potential. Cities don't flourish under negativity. I think it will have an important place in the Wasatch Front.

Hendrickson's last day with the City is July 6. Assistant City Administrator and Economic Development Director Ifo Pili will be the new city administrator. Pili has been with the City for six years. Human Resources Director Jason Walker will take on the duties of assistant city administrator.

Eagle Mountain residents Re: Restricted Fireworks areas in Eagle Mountain

Residents of Eagle Mountain,

For 2012, fireworks are legal to be used in Utah from July 1 through July 7 and July 21 through July 27 only. There is a curfew of 11 p.m., with an extension to midnight on the day of the holidays. If found, illegal fireworks will be confiscated by the sheriff or fire department, with the potential of the users being cited.

In light of the Dump Fire and continuing high wildfire danger, Eagle Mountain City is banning fireworks from the following subdivisions: Castle Rock (only homes next to Mountain Ranch Bike Park), Lake Mountain Road, Cedar Pass Ranch, North Ranch, Ruby Valley, Lone Tree, Kiowa Valley, Eagle Top, Point Lookout, Hidden Canyon, Fremont Springs, Meadow Ranch, Valley View, and White Hills. All other residents who live close to these areas, with fields or hills adjacent to your home, please use fireworks as far away from potential dangers as possible.

We encourage residents who are planning to use fireworks in the city limits to use extreme caution, limit use to concrete or asphalt surface areas and have a water source close by. Extinguish and dispose of used fireworks properly. Please make all members of your family aware of these new restrictions.



A map of the restricted areas is posted on the City website at www.eaglemountaincity.com, along with alternate locations the City is offering to residents to light fireworks.






