FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

JULY WAS A MONTH OF GOOD NEWS AND PROGRESS FOR OUR CITY.

We broke ground for our new Energy Department building, we held our 4th annual Economic Development Golf Tournament and our first Beat the Heat Bonanza. We started the process for an Economic Development Area to help facilitate new businesses in the city, and we are up and running with transparency.

Our Public Works and Energy Departments have shared a building for years and outgrew the facility some time ago. We broke ground for a new building that will be able to house our personnel and equipment and are excited about the project. The building will be located just north of our current public works building on Pony Express Parkway.

Four years ago our then Economic Development Director Ifo Pili established a golf tournament as an opportunity to showcase Eagle Mountain to local businesses and potential businesses. Our first year we had about 40 participants. This year we had over 120 participants. We are excited for our future economic development. This tournament does not cost the City any money to put it on. It is covered through sponsorships and green fees.

On Saturday, July 21, residents were slipping and sliding their way through Nolan Park at the Beat the Heat Bonanza. They enjoyed free waterslides and hotdogs and just had a great day. Thank you to our events department for coming up with fresh ideas for fun. Thank you to the firefighters for cooking and for all the other staff that helped make this event a success.

We are working with Alpine School District and Utah County, as well as the State Board of Education to put together an Economic Development Area. We are hoping to be able to put in the infrastructure needed to support a new manufacturing company in our city. We will keep you posted on the progress.

Finally, the state legislature passed an amendment to the code to require cities to provide our financial records online. It has taken us longer then we hoped or anticipated to accomplish this task, but it is finally finished. You are now able to review our records from the 2011 and 2012 budget years on the state's website at Utah.gov. A big thank you to Paul Jerome, our new finance director, and his staff for making that happen.

Adopted an ordinance adopting the Economic Development Fund budget amendment, to include the addition of \$25,000 into personnel services on the expenditure side.

Denied a claim for property damage caused by sewer back-up, submitted by Angela and Jeff Duke.

Approved an addendum to the agreement between Eagle Mountain City and Direct Communications Cedar Valley, LLC (DCCV) for Power Ring Services.

Approved a Civil Legal Services Agreement between Eagle Mountain City and Parsons Kinghorn Harris and authorized the Mayor to sign the contract.

Awarded a bid to Rhet Marsing Enterprises, LLC for the construction of Phase 2 of the South Substation in the amount of \$462,432.00, and authorized the Mayor to execute the agreement.

Adopted a Resolution appointing two representatives, Mayor Heather Jackson and City Administrator Ifo Pili, to the Taxing Entity Committee ("TEC") of the Eagle Mountain Economic Development Project Area #2012-1.

A groundbreaking ceremony for the City's new energy department building was held July 17. Elected officials, City staff, architects, and contractors got the construction process started. The building is expected to be completed in about six months. It will be located north of the public works building on Pony Express Parkway in City Center.

Changes in online bill pay and dump passes

There are procedural changes the utility billing office would like residents to be aware of related to online bill pay and dump passes.

If you use online bill pay for your utility bills, the City has a new online payment provider -- Xpress Bill Pay. The City made the switch due to significant cost savings and advanced features like full bill presentation, billing history, auto pay, payment wallets, paperless billing, enhanced email notifications, single logon for access to multiple accounts, and much more.

You will be directed to the new website when you select the "Bill Pay" option on the City website. You will need to visit the new site to establish an account. There are no fees for establishing an account or using Xpress Bill Pay to pay your Eagle Mountain City utility bill.

If you had auto pay, or recurring payments setup with our previous provider, you will need to establish an new auto pay with Xpress Bill Pay. You must act immediately to ensure your payment is received.

Eagle Mountain City has ended our contract with North Pointe Solid Waste in Lindon. At the beginning of August, we will be using the new Intermountain Regional Landfill (IRL) in Fairfield for dump services. Any residents who have already been issued dump passes for North Pointe may hold on to them, and they will be accepted by IRL. Passes are no longer being accepted by North Pointe.

IRL is open Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. The address is: 800 S. Allen Ranch Road, Fairfield. Directions are: Take SR-73 to Allen Ranch Road, pass the Fairfield Cemetery, and pass the construction & demolition landfill. After one mile turn left for half a mile. Look for signs for the landfill and heavy equipment.

The City is now issuing dump passes for IRL. Residents may claim up to two dump passes per household per year free of charge at our utility billing office, with ID.

As part of the City's storm drain maintenance we try to maintain the swales adjacent to the roads in areas that do not have curb and gutter. Typically, the City will mow these areas 2-3 times a year. Placing anything in the swale areas could hinder the City's ability to maintain the swales, and compromise the integrity of the swales. Residents, please contact the City if you want to improve this area, so we can help make sure it is done in a manner that won't jeopardize storm runoff.

Should I call the City or the HOA?

We often get questions regarding who is the appropriate entity to call regarding maintenance or service requests. We hope that the following information will be helpful. Most service requests for the City can also be reported via our mobile app.

The Ranches HOA & Eagle Mountain City

Eagle Mountain City owns all the common areas; parks; playground structures and water systems within the Ranches HOA. The Ranches HOA maintains these areas for the city. The HOA does not install or make improvements to these areas; but maintains what was installed by the city or developers. The exceptions within the Ranches HOA are Nolan Park, the entrance to Mount Airey, and the Eagle Mountain sign near that entrance, which are maintained by the city.

Clarification of City Code: HOA guidelines: CC&R's

The city has specific codes that residents need to abide by. Homeowners who are a part of the Ranches HOA also have a set of Master guidelines; as well as individual CC&R's (Conditions, Covenants and Restrictions) for their individual subdivisions. The Ranches HOA Master guidelines cannot be less restrictive than any city code; but they can be more restrictive than city code. The individual CC&R's of subdivisions cannot be less restrictive than the Ranches Master HOA guidelines; but can be more restrictive than those guidelines.
