WELCOME HOME! FOR THOSE OF YOU WHO MISSED IT, WE WELCOMED SEVERAL SOLDIERS HOME IN JANUARY. THEY ARE ALL MEMBERS OF THE 211 AVIATION UNIT OF THE UTAH ARMY NATIONAL GUARD. WE ARE HAPPY TO HAVE THEM BACK HOME AND EVEN HAPPIER THAT THEY ALL CAME HOME SAFE AND SOUND.

We would also like to thank CW2 Luke Pannell who brought a U.S. Flag that he flew over Afghanistan along with a Flag Dedication Certificate. The Certificate reads: "The accompanying Flag of the United States of America was flown over the hostile skies of Afghanistan in honor of Eagle Mountain City. This flag flew over Regional Command North Area of Operations on an AH-64D Apache Attack Helicopter, performing a combat mission in direct support of Operation Enduring Freedom XII on 11 September 2012. C co. 1-211th ARB (Task Force Pirate) FOB Kunduz, Afghanistan." The certificate is signed by CW2 Luke Pannell, Pilot in Command. He also brought their unit poster which is currently in the library. We would love to have any or all of the members of the 211th who were recently deployed stop by and sign the poster. We will keep it in the library until February 28, 2013. At that point we will have it framed and then posted in city hall. Thank you all again for your service and this very special gift. We appreciate what you do for us.

Tabled the adoption of an ordinance amending the Municipal Code Title 6, Animals and Chapter 17.85, Animal Regulations until there is a means of enforcement (vote was 4:1 with John Painter voting no).

New chamber president champions home-based businesses

Mark Welcker, the Lehi Area Chamber of Commerce's new president, is an experienced home-based business owner who hopes to draw more of these businesses into joining the Chamber.

With hundreds of licensed home-based businesses, Eagle Mountain is a big area of focus for Welcker, who recently met with the City to introduce himself and outline his goals.

"If you look at what makes America strong, it's the smaller companies that are the backbone of our economy," Welcker said. "I think it's important to do what we can to help them succeeed."

The Chamber has already approved a discounted membership fee for home-based business owners. For example, the bronze membership fee is \$75 instead of the usual \$150.

Welcker is hoping to offer additional incentives for home-based businesses,

including free or reduced advertising and promotional opportunities.

A native of Utah County, Welcker is a graduate of UVU with a bachelor's degree in Business Management. He has 19 years professional experience in the field of business. This background includes sales, marketing, finance, product development and real estate development.

Always civic-minded, Welcker was the co-founder of the Highland City Youth Council, served on the American Fork City Beautification Committee, was a 2002 Salt Lake City Olympic volunteer, and a Utah County Delegate for the 2012 elections.

Fire safety - Portable Heaters

An estimated 900 portable heater fires in homes are reported to U.S. fire departments each year and cause an estimated 70 deaths, 150 injuries and \$53 million in property loss.

Only two percent of heating fires in homes involve portable heaters; however, portable heaters are involved in 45 percent of all fatal heating fires in homes!

You can prevent a portable heater fire in your home this winter by following a few fire safety steps:

- Turn heaters off when you go to bed or leave the room.
- Keep anything that can burn such as bedding, clothing and curtains at least three feet away.
- Only use portable heaters from a recognized testing laboratory and with an automatic shut-off so that if they tip over, they shut off.
- Plug portable heaters directly into outlets and never into an extension cord or power strip.


