FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

THIS MONTH I WANT TO ADDRESS OUR UTILITY RATES AND BILLS.

Our new billing format should be available by the May bill. It will include: rates for all the utilities, budget billing deferred balance, policies for shut-off and payment, graphs for a one year history, side-by-side comparisons of the current month and the same month last year, as well as the current and previous month's meter read for all measureable utilities. We hope this will help everyone understand what we are using in our households as well as how that compares to what was used last year, etc.

All of our measureable utility (water, gas, and electric) rates have two components. There is a base rate, which is set to cover our debt service or bond payments, and a usage rate. We felt it was important to evaluate the rates of all of our measureable utilities and requested outside consultants to study our rates and rate structures. These studies are multi-year studies. We went through a competitive process and selected Lewis, Young, Robertson & Burningham (LYRB) to do the water rate study and Sawvel to do the electric rate study. We later added the gas rate study to Sawvel's contract. Due to changes in new customers, potential large users, our capital facilities plan, the reduction in rates due to changing our fire protection to UFA and our agreements to purchase power, gas and water, these studies have taken more time than we anticipated.

Last month we heard the final report from Sawvel on the gas and electric rates. They outlined several things. We need to implement different types of rate payers, mostly different types of commercial rate payers. We have some new commercial users coming on board in the near future and need to be prepared to offer a rate structure that meets the needs of their business type and usage of our utility system. They also found that changes need to be made to our rates for residential customers, as well. The City Council will be discussing these rates in the first City Council meeting in April and implementing any rate changes the second meeting in April. The dates for those meetings are April 2 & 16. Some of the rate changes are being proposed with effective dates that take place immediately and some will have



delayed effective dates.

We have given some additional information to LYRB to make some final calculations on our water rate study. We anticipate seeing those numbers soon. We will be presenting them to the City Council in the first meeting in May and then implementing any rate changes the second meeting in May.

As we are looking to make these changes we would love to hear from you. Please come to our meetings so that you may get a better understanding of what these studies show. If you have questions please feel free to give us a call or make an appointment to meet with me or anyone else on our staff. We are here to help and serve you. MARCH.....

Approved an agreement with the Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) for the Pony Express Trail (from Plum Creek subdivision to Redwood Rd.).

Approved an agreement for professional services between the City and Canon Business Solutions for IT services.

Appointed Justin Loera to the Economic Development Board.

Approved the final plat of SilverLake Plat 8 subject to the conditions in the staff report, as well as the reduction of lots 821, 826, 835, 834 and 841, to reduce the lot sizes to include not more than five feet within the easement; and the southward adjustment of the lots on the west side of what is now Cassidy Way to the south, as discussed; the north side of Red River Road to be adjusted to the west as much as possible; and the corner of lot 808 to be cut and put into 809; all adjustments to be approved by the Planning Director. (Vote was 3:1 with Council Member Ireland voting no and Council Member Painter not present.

Approved an award of bid to Tempest Enterprises for construction of a 6"steel natural gas pipeline in the amount of \$934,574.



Spring Clean-Up Dumpsters

Dumpters for yard and general waste are being offered free of charge for residents' use through April 23. The dumpsters are located at the Public Works Building, 2545 N. Pony Express (about two miles south of City Hall, in front of the wastewater treatment facility). If these dates do not work for you, please remember Eagle Mountain City residents get two free dump passes per year. You may pick them up at the Utility Billing department at City Hall (Mon.-Fri., 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.).

The following items cannot be put in the dumpsters: appliances, tires, electronics, batteries, chemicals, paint.

When the dumpsters are full, Ace Disposal will change them out as soon as they can. Please do not leave items in overflowing dumpsters or next to the dumpsters. We plan to post on the City website, News section when dumpsters are full and when they have been emptied to aid in your planning.

We are often asked why the City does not offer additional locations for the dumpsters. The dumpsters are provided at the Public Works building so that we can monitor and maintain the dumpsters. As the dumpsters get full, City employees will often have to mash down the trash with backhoes to provide additional room until they are emptied. There are times when the dumpsters get too full before they are emptied, and having them by the Public Works building helps to contain the trash that would otherwise be dispersed into the community. It also allows the staff to clean up the overflows with equipment kept at the Public Works building.

Unified Fire Authority

RESIDENTIAL BURN PERMIT

The open burn policy was changed in 2013 to meet the revised standards of the State Department of Air Quality (DAQ). Recent modifications to these rules change the open burn periods and include a statewide requirement to obtain a permit from the lo-

Burn permits may be issued between March 30 and May 30 and between September 15 and October 30.

Only residents on (1) or more acres are eligible to apply for a residential burn permit.

The cost for the burn permit is \$25.

The DAQ no longer allows permits to be issued on a monthly or annually basis as had been done previously. The DAQ open burn permit application and UFA issued burn permit is required for each separate burn. Residents need to complete the online permit application with the DAQ prior to obtaining a fire department permit. The DAQ will forward the applicant's information on to the Unified Fire Authority.

The permit application process begins at the DAQ's website. Follow the link below: http://www.airquality.utah.gov/Compliance/OpenBurning/index.htm

The \$25 permit fee is paid online at the UFA website. Follow the link below: https://www.unifiedfire.org/Payments/ufa_payment.aspx

Once the application has been processed and fee has been paid, the UFA will contact the applicant to arrange a site inspection. The fire department shall view the area, what is to be burned and verify that it is a green burn day prior to issuing the burn permit.

Be sure to plan ahead - the entire permitting process could take 3-5 days to complete.


