FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

I HOPE YOU HAVE NOTICED OUR NEW AND IMPROVED UTILITY BILLING STATEMENTS. IT HAS TAKEN SOME TIME TO GET THIS FORMATTED WITH OUR ACCOUNTING SOFTWARE COMPANY AND THE MAILING COMPANY THAT WE USE.

We have incorporated a few things to help make the bills more user-friendly. There is a section which outlines the rates for all of the utilities, and we have included historical usage for utilities that are metered. There are graphs of your consumption over the last year as well.

I understand that residents can get frustrated by the amount of time it takes for the City to implement changes. Even though things sometimes take longer than we would like, it is important to make sure that we follow proper procedures, going through the process with open meetings, committees, boards, etc. I appreciate those who stick it out. We have some great projects that have come from residents collaborating with the City. Two such projects that have been accomplished within the last year are a new play structure in Pioneer Addition and a new basketball court in Porter's Crossing. Both of these projects were alternatives to sand volleyball courts that were not being used and became more of a hazard and an eyesore than an amenity. I'm really grateful for those individuals who work hard to bring these projects through our process. They make our community so much better.

The council members and I are happy to hear your comments and suggestions. We are elected to represent you. I appreciate getting your emails and try to answer them as quickly as possible. If you have an idea for how to make something better, we would love to hear it. None of us feel that we have cornered the market on good ideas. We always welcome input and spend time vetting through suggestions. I am always looking for ways to improve our city. Please call, email or set up an appointment to meet with me. I would love to hear from you.

Some of the concerns I have heard recently are regarding our youth sports programs. There are questions about how we get better umpires and referees in all sports and how we can make our facilities better. We don't currently have the answers to all of these questions, but we have made changes over the last year to make improvements. First, we made our sports program director a full time position and allowed him to hire a couple of part time employees to help him run the programs. We are looking into other ways of funding referees/ umpires and giving more training to those that are filling those duties. We have allocated funding for some improvements at the Mid-Valley Baseball Complex. That funding is minimal and we are trying to find ways to stretch those dollars. One of those ways is to get volunteers to help with building and beautifying the area. Please look for opportunities to get involved in the future.

We appreciate all of those that already volunteer their time and energy in our community. You are the people that really make Eagle Mountain a great place to live. Thank you and enjoy the last couple of weeks of summer.

Adopted an ordinance of Eagle Mountain City, Utah, annexing an area of approximately 223 acres commonly known as the Hindley Annexation.

Approved a reimbursement agreement with SITLA for the Mid Valley Road completion project, as amended.

Approved an award of bid to Staker Parson for the Mid Valley Road completion project.

Approved an amendment to The Ranches Master Home Owners Association (HOA) maintenance agreement, modifying exhibit 1 from 6.5 months to 5.5 months, making the total water allocation 50,347,946 gallons per season. Vote was 4:1 with Council Member Painter voting no.

Appointed poll workers for the 2013 Primary & General Municipal Elections in Eagle Mountain City.

Adopted a resolution amending the Policies and Procedures Manual.

Approved an award of bid to Niels Fugal Sons Company, LLC for the 2013 Electric Main Feeders and Gas Lines Construction Project.

Approved an award of bid to Codale Electric Supply, Inc. for electric materials for the Kiowa Valley capacity upgrade.

UTA Offers Free Extended Parking

In response to public feedback, the Utah Transit Authority is offering free extended parking as part of a one-year pilot program. As of July 1, 2013 UTA passengers can park their cars free of charge for an unlimited amount of time at most TRAX and Front-Runner lots, including Lehi and American Fork. The program also eliminates the current fee requirement at the Draper and Jordan Valley stations. The pilot program is designed to help UTA riders conveniently connect to the Salt Lake International Airport.

Over the next year, UTA will measure parking lot usage and monitor costs, maintenance requirements, impacts to snow removal and security issues before determining if the program will be extended.

UTA will continue its existing parking lot security measures, which include regular patrols and video surveillance. UTA is not responsible for damage and theft and encourages riders to practice common-sense precautions such as locking their vehicles and making sure that valuables are not visible inside the car. Suspicious activity should be reported to 801-287-EYES or by texting "UTA Tip" to CRIMES.

Voters may vote for one candidate for Mayor and up to two candidates for City Council. The two candidates for Mayor with the highest number of votes will continue on to the General Election as well as the top four candidates for City Council. The General Election will be held November 5, 2013.

At the time of our printing deadine, two debates were scheduled--a debate for City Council candidates on July 31 and Mayor candidates on August 8, both moderated by The Crossroads Journal newspaper and held at City Hall. Alpine School District Special Education

Records Destruction Notice: Alpine School District is required to give public notice before destroying archived special education records. If you were born between January 1, 1986 and December 31, 1986, received special education services through Alpine School District, and want to claim copies of your records before they are destroyed, please contact Lacey Jackson 801-610-8461 before Friday, November 29, 2013. Records will be destroyed at the end of 2013.

"Child Find" Programs for Disabled Persons Notice:

The Alpine School District Department of Special Education is attempting to contact persons with disabilities between the ages of birth and twentyone in compliance with the Federal law, which mandates the provision of free educational programs and/or services for such persons.

If a child is having significant difficulty with vision, hearing, speech, behavior, is experiencing slow development untypical for his/her age, physical impairments, or learning difficulty, he/ she may be a child with a disability. If you know of any child whom you feel might qualify for these services, including students suspected of having a disability even though they are advancing from grade to grade, in a private school, homeless, or migrant, please contact the principal of your school or the Special Education office of Alpine School District at 801-610-8410.

If you are the parent of a child with an IEP enrolled in a public school, we are required by Utah Code Section 53A-1a-704(10) to inform you of the availability of a scholarship to attend a private school through the Carson Smith Scholarship Program.
