CITY PROJECTS

Following are construction/infrastructure projects happening in the city this month:

Public Works Department:

CWP Pony Express Pipeline

The water department has contracted with VanCon Construction to install a 24 inch water line to connect to the Central Utah Water Conservancy District's water system. This will allow the City to use water that has been contracted for an additional source of water for the City. The project is expected to be completed by May of this year.

The water line is currently being built along the north side of Pony Express Parkway, near the SilverLake subdivison. It will continue east to 800 West in Saratoga Springs. Once the construction is completed to 800 West, construction will begin at Smith Ranch Road and will continue to about a half mile west of Ranches Parkway.

- Evans Ranch subdivision along Porters Crossing across from Clark Street (Ranches)
- Silverlake subdivision new phase east end south of Pony Express Parkway (Ranches)
- Ranches Parkway Extension- extending road north of SR 73 for future development
- Skyline Ridge C subdivision west of Kiowa Valley (Ranches)
- The Arrival subdivision west of North Ranch (north side of SR 73)

Energy Department:

- Power line upgrade north side of SR 73 from Meadow Ranch to North Ranch
- Power line uppgrade east side of Porter's Crossing from Pony Express south to Kiowa



EM resident offers support to Philippines

On November 8, 2013, Typhoon Haiyan destroyed the lives of tens of thousands of people in the central Philippines. Sam Hale, of Eagle Mountain and firefighter/paramedic with the Sandy Fire Department, lived in this part of the world in 1999 and 2000 while he was serving a mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. Sam lived and served among the Philipino people and always wanted to return to the Philippines, specifically to serve them.

Today, Sam has eight years of medical experience as a firefighter paramedic and is also a skilled craftsman operating his own handyman business. He now has the opportunity to apply these skills and expertise to help rebuild the homes and lives of those who were devastated by the storm. In early January, Sam will travel to the Philippines for a week with the nonprofit organization Charity Vision. For the past 29 years Charity Vision has been providing free medical surgeries and care to the people.

"There is some amazing work going on with this group of humanitarians," Hale said. "I am excited to be able to travel with this group in January to give aid and restore HOPE. It was exciting to hear about the work that they did on their first trip. The biggest thing I got from this meeting is the importance of bringing hope
