Eagle Mountain City 2015 Accomplishments

- Sale of gas and electric utilities
- Prison relocation effort
- New businesses Domino's, Subway, Central Utah Clinic (now Revere Health), Sunset Storage & RV, Ace Rents, Precious People Day Care Center, and Questar offices.
- Parks improvements Pioneer Park, SilverLake Amphitheater, Bobby Wren Fitness Park, Pony Express Skate Park, additional trail in Eagle Point subdivision, Pony Express Memorial Cemetery - trees and began construction on entrance monument, 10 interments.
- Recreation Youth sports programs continue to grow with 3,402 kids participating, 313 teams, and over 800 volunteer coaches/team parents.
- **Finance department** received the ninth consecutive distinguished budget award from the GFOA and the fiscal year audit had no significant findings.
- Library Increased programs: Lego club, STEAM, Bilingual storytime, Mommy & Me yoga, Random Acts of Family Fun, and more. Received grants for technology and programs.
- **Streets** Repaving projects on Ranches Pkwy, Pony Express Pkwy, Sunset Dr, Cedar Trails Wy, Mt Airey, Willow Springs, Half Mile Rd, and Stagecoach Dr.

- Special Events Added successful Back to School Dance to other annual events and kept Pony Express Days under budget.
- **Engineering** Assisted with design of new traffic signal at Wride Hwy and Sunset Dr., assisted in design of construction of Pony Express Trail to Redwood Rd, design for water line for additional support for subdivisions on north side of Wride Hwy.
- **Recorder's Office** Issued 124 new business licenses with 314 renewals, conducted successful 2015 Primary and General Election with cooperation of Utah County, completed JLUS implementation grant.
- Utility Billing Assisted customers with transition to new gas and electric utilities, assisted with implementing online forms, analyzed and processed past-due accounts

to resume collections processes.

- **Building** Issued 825 building permits (490 residential) and performed 5,533 building inspections.
- Sheriff's Office Responded to 7,179 calls for service, made 89 DUI arrests, conducted 4,068 traffic stops, issued 1,222 citations, provided community safety programs.
- **Planning** Bicycle & pedestrian master plan, Pony Express Pkwy Trail, five master development plans and agreements, seven code amendments, 251 code enforcement violation notices with over 300 warnings, along with hundreds of verbal warnings, illegal dumping clean-up.
- Economic Development Received grants to improve Wride Park sports complex and Mountain Ranch Bike Park, EM Business Forum, EM Tech Jam, Economic Development Summit.

- Water/Sewer Fixed or replaced 1,000 meters and ERT's, new security system for wells and tanks, updated chlorine systems in wells,434 new residential meters installed, sewer system treated 427,729,380 gallons.
- Public Information Prep and launch of Everbridge emergency notification system, new online web forms with payment integration, prison relocation and utilities sale communication

I am proud of what has been accomplished this past year and look forward to more improvements in the continued development of Eagle Mountain City in this coming year.

This is subject to the receipt of a copy of the military personnel's official active duty deployment orders by the Utility Billing Department. The amount of the utility service fees abatement will be \$25.00 of the total monthly utility bill.

This system allows the Utah Valley Dispatch to have access to our database of contacts in the event of a large-scale emergency or if cell/ internet access is down in our area.
