THE EAGLE'S VIEW



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SUMMERTIME FOR THE CITY MEANS THE BUDGET HAS BEEN PASSED, WHICH STARTS THE SEASON OF TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENTS.

With the new budget approved in June and opening on July 1, the City gets moving as quickly as possible to complete projects before the weather turns colder. The most time-sensitive projects are transportation related. Typically half of road projects are completed after the start of the new budget in July, and the rest pause for the fall and winter. Road projects resume in early summer of the following year. The City has made tremendous strides in knocking out a hefty amount of maintenance on our arterial roads and are now turning our focus to collector roads. Our aim is to eventually get the entire City's transportation infrastructure on a five-year maintenance plan.

Here is a list of transportation projects for the new fiscal year:

Maintenance:

-High Density Mineral Bonding for subdivision streets (\$190k) This treatment will be applied to various areas of the city in order to rejuvenate asphalt on select roads.

-Cedar Drive Overlay/Repair (\$50k) This treatment will be the first step in rehabilitating roads in Cedar Pass Ranch.

-Crest Rd/Cedar Pass Rd Overlay/Repair (\$50k). This is the same as Cedar Drive.


-Ranches Pkwy NB Chip Seal (\$76k) This treatment will be the same as the chip seal that was completed on the southbound roads a couple of years ago.

-Pony Express Pkwy S. Chip Seal (\$92k) This will be for a section of Pony Express that heads out to the City Community Development building.

-EM Blvd W. Chip Seal (\$253.5k) This is a large chip seal job which will renew the road surface from the roundabout out to Wride Hwy.

All maintenance processes begin with identifying areas where the road may be significantly damaged and removing failed sections, repairing the road base, and patching the surface before treatment.

Capital Improvements:



Eagle Mountain City recognized Marianne and Glenn Smith as the first Pony Express Days Parade Grand Marshals in honor of the City's 20th anniversary. The Smiths are longtime residents of EM who were chosen to represent the caring and involved people who have made our community great. Marianne currently serves on the Cemetery Advisory Board.

-Traffic Signal (Porter's Crossing & Pony Express Pkwy. (\$250K) -Bobby Wren Ext. (\$550k) City code requires that all new subdivisions have two points of access, though some do not. This project will include a trail along the street and will provide a second access point for residents in sections of Pioneer Addition. -Golden Eagle Rd. (\$100k) This project will eliminate the remaining section of dirt road and connect Kiowa Valley with a second paved access.

-Hummer Rd. (\$30k) This section will connect existing streets and run past the new park.

-Salt Shed (\$250k) Not only will this help our crews to work more efficiently during plowing operations, it will bring our salting operation into compliance with EPA standards.

-Sunset Drive Improvements (\$447k)

-Side Path/Bike Plan Improvements (\$185.5k) These are safety improvements to bike and pedestrian crossings at roundabouts and arterial roads.

These improvements are subject to change as timelines and circumstances dictate.

Help Keep Eagle Mountain Beautiful

With many new residents moving in, Eagle Mountain City would like to make everyone aware of common City Code violations and provide information we hope will help keep our community beautiful. If you have questions or concerns about any of the following, please contact Code Enforcement Officer Mike Malay at mmalay@emcity.org or 801-789-6690.

• Weeds (lawn care)- It is the property owner's responsibility to keep the property clean and understand weed control standards. Weeds may not be allowed to grow more than six inches high on any property.

• Vehicle Parking/Trailers- Parking a commercial vehicle, RV, truck, or trailer on a public street for a period longer than two hours within a 24 hour period is not allowed. RVs and trailers cannot be parked in the front yard area of any residential zone.

• Junk- It is the homeowner's responsibility to keep property free of junk (including vehicles that are inoperable or not registered).

• Noise-Noise levels and hours of restriction: 9:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. Monday through Friday and 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays

• Waste-Trash is not allowed to be built up on public or private property. There are code requirements for placement of trash containers for collection. Residents are eligible for two courtesy landfill passes each year available from the City.

• Please follow code requirements for yard sales and protocol for temporary signs. Yard sale signs that are no larger than four square feet in size are allowed in the park strip on local roads, and between the sidewalk and the fence on the major roads (Ranches Pkwy, Pony Express Pkwy, etc.) when you register your sale with the City. Registration is available under the Community section of the City website. If your sale is not registered, your signs may be removed. Signs are allowed only on the day of your sale. No signs are allowed on power poles, lamp posts, fences, trees, grass/decorative rock strip medians between traffic lanes or between the curb and sidewalks.
