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BACK-TO-SCHOOL SEASON IS HERE.

With a new school and new roads and traffic signals, travel times and safe pedestrian routes are on everyone's mind.

With a combination of financing resources through Mountainland Association of Governments, UDOT, and city budgeting we were able to move up the Pony Express widening project a couple of years to meet the demands of a new high school. The City has been working frantically with contractors all year, with the hope of having lights functioning and construction cones out of the way by the time school opens. Here is where we are to-date and what we expect in the coming weeks.



Main water lines are going in between Hidden Valley Pkwy and Sandpiper Rd. We expect that work to be completed by August 8. Once the pipe is installed, then road base and paving can be begin. We expect that section of road to be completed before school starts.

Now that the power lines have been moved, work has begun on the west lanes of Pony Express Pkwy from Lake Mountain Rd. to Mid Valley Rd. (at Frontier Middle School). That lane widening will not be finished before school begins and could extend through the end of the month. This section of road was

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added to the project after we acquired additional funding just a few months ago. So though it will not be finished by school opening, we are happy to have it completed very soon. All other paving, including trails along Pony Express, should be completed before school starts. Aviator Ave. is finished, with an additional lane to make parking easier and traffic safer around Cedar Valley High School.

Four new traffic lights have been installed (at Red Hawk Ranch/Saddle Rock Rd., Hidden Valley Pkwy, Mid Valley Rd., and Aviator Ave.) to help traffic flow and provide safer pedestrian crossings. Rocky Mountain Power estimates that they will have permanent power to those lights before school opens, so we expect them to be fully functioning for school traffic. Due to a delay in materials, the signal planned for Smith Ranch Rd. will not be installed until mid-September. Crossing guards will still be posted at the intersections where the new signals have been installed. A painted crosswalk and flashing stop signs will be added to the intersection at Bobby Wren Blvd., which will remain a four-way stop for now.

As paving is completed, temporary striping will be applied. The temporary striping will be inexpensive and non-reflective. Permanent reflective striping will be applied in October after a micro-surfacing treatment is completed. I mention this because just about the time it looks like road construction is finished, the micro-surfacing will follow, covering up, binding and protecting the existing paving. So be prepared for follow-up surface work after the main construction is finished. At that point the final reflective striping will be done and we can enjoy our new roadway unobstructed with cones and equipment.

I hope everyone enjoys what is left of summer vacation. We have some fun events to look forward to this month, including the Beat the Heat Bonanza, Grand Opening of Cedar Valley High School, End of Summer Dance Party, and coming up in September, Shopfest Utah.

Submit service requests like potholes and traffic signal problems by using the Click 'n Fix map on UDOT's website or the mobile app. UDOT only assists with requests on state and federal highways, like Redwood Road (S.R. 68) and Wride Memorial Hwy (S.R. 73).

EMERGENCY PREPARATION TIP

Taking care of Children's Needs

Why Prepare for Disaster?

Disaster can strike without warning, forcing you to go for days without basic necessities or to evacuate your home. Relief workers will be on scene following a disaster, but may not be able to reach you immediately. You need to be prepared. Knowing the steps to take during a disaster-whether flooding, tornadoes, earthquakes or another crisis-can greatly reduce the danger and distress your family may face.

Tip of the Month: Children

As a parent, you will need to provide for your children's physical and emotional needs. You will have to cope with the disaster in a way that will prevent them from developing a sense of loss.



When dealing with children before, during and after a disaster, speak their language, let them ask questions and let them know that they are safe.

Children will have different reactions to disasters (often age related), but the two most common signs of distress are changes in behavior and behavior regression. Preschoolers may resume thumb-sucking or become afraid of strangers.

Before disaster strikes, you can help your children better cope by involving them in the planning and practice of your emergency plan. They can also keep your emergency kits up to date.

There are varying age-specific items to include in emergency kits for children. Some items are to help keep kids entertained and distracted in times of distress, while others are to help parents take care of younger children. Some of these items include books, crayons and paper, a favorite toy, games, photos of family or pets, extra clothes and shoes, comfort food, toothbrush and toothpaste, small first aid kit, and paper with home address, phone numbers and parents' names. Children should also know how to call 911 and whom to contact if they can't contact you.

The city offers CERT training in October and has monthly training on how to be prepared on the second Thursday of every month at 7:00 p.m. at City Hall, except for December.



Services

Did you know the Eagle Mountain Public Library has no fines for late books? They are the only library in the North County Library Cooperative that maintains this policy. If you are late turning in your library book borrowed from the Eagle Mountain Library, just bring it in. No fees or fines!

The cities of American Fork, Eagle Mountain, Highland, Lehi, Pleasant Grove, and Saratoga Springs participate in a reciprocal borrowing system that allows library card holders at any of the cooperating libraries to check out materials from each library. It is called the North County Library Cooperative. All patrons must have a valid library card from their assigned "home library" and must be in good standing at that library to obtain privileges at another library.



This is not a County library system. Each library maintains its own policies, budget, administration, fees, etc. Library borrowers are encouraged to first search for needed materials at their home library before searching the other libraries' online catalogs. Materials checked out at each library must be returned to the library they were checked out from according to the due date. All policies and procedures of the lending library are valid and the patron must abide by said policies and will be responsible for any incurred charges.

YOUR RECYCLING PROGRAM IS CHANGING

Dear Resident.

Due to changes in the recycling markets, we have updated our list of acceptable material in your blue recycling container. Attached to the other side of this notice is our new recycling guide.

Frequently asked questions regarding your recycling program:

What happens to my recycling?

After it is picked up at the curb, your recycling gets taken to a Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) where it is sorted, baled by material type, and sold to a processor.

What is recycling contamination?

Recycling contamination refers to items that are placed in the recycling bin that do belong in there, as well as items that still contain food or liquids. Currently there is a 25-30% contamination rate in recycling material collected from residents. It is costly to remove and transport contaminants to a landfill.

How clean should my recyclables be?

Your recyclables should be empty and dry. Use a spoon or spatula to scrape out food globs, you do not have to rinse your recyclables. If you can flip your containers upside down and nothing is dripping out, you can place it in your recycling bin.

Why can't I place plastic bags/film in my recycling bin?

Plastic bags and films, such as grocery bags and bread bags, get wrapped up in the machinery at the recycling facility, gumming up the equipment. Please do not place plastic bags or film in your recycling bin and do not bag your recyclables.



Proper Use of City Parks for Events

Eagle Mountain City would like residents to be aware of restrictions related to holding events at parks. If residents, businesses, or other organizations wish to hold events at City parks, a special event <u>permit application</u> is required to be submitted and approved. The more notice given, the better to provide adequate time for the review and approval process.

The following are not allowed: vehicles on grass, fireworks, chemicals, stakes or other objects pounded into ground, paint, or markers on benches or concrete.

Everything must be cleaned up and hauled away. Water taps not available - no dunk booths, no inflatables of any kind.

A reservation and payment of rental fees is required for city park pavilions from April 15-October 15. The <u>pavilion reservation system</u> is only accessible via computer and does not work on mobile devices.
