MANY GOOD THINGS ARE HAPPENING IN THE CITY.

I'd like to provide an overview of some of what we have been working on over the past month.

Pony Express Pkwy

The widening project for Pony Express Pkwy is wrapping up. The contractor is currently working on storm drain infrastructure and is hoping to have the project completed (the last phase of widening from Lake Mountain Rd to Mid Valley Rd) no later than October 14. We will be glad to see this project finished and appreciate that we were able to work with the contractor to add the

additional segment. The City will continue to pursue funding to widen the section from Mid Valley Rd to Bobby Wren Blvd.

Podcast

We have added a podcast to our line-up of information sources for residents. "<u>Talking Up Eagle Mountain</u>" is about 30 minutes long and allows listeners to sit in on discussions about city news, events, and programs. The style is conversational, usually involving three specialists and the mayor. So far we have had discussions on preserving open space for deer migration and other wildlife, road construction, economic development, and health & safety concerns for school children.

Transportation



EMERGENCY PREPARATION TIP

Fires

Every year more than 350,000 homes in the United States are struck by fire. There are easy steps to take to reduce the chance that your home will be damaged, or anyone injured in a blaze – whether it starts inside or outside of your home.

Practice Home Fire Safety

- Have smoke detectors and fire extinguishers on every level your home.
- Test and clean smoke detectors monthly and replace batteries at least twice a year.
- Check fire extinguisher pressure gauges monthly.
- Store matches and lighters out of the sight and reach of children.



- Do not overload electrical outlets or run cords underneath rugs.
- Inspect electrical cords for damage and replace or repair them if needed.
- Keep space heaters at least 3 feet from furniture and drapes.
- Clean the lint screen on your dryer before each use.
- Have your furnace inspected every year. Change filters several times each year.
- Store flammable materials and chemicals safely away from sources of heat.Clean fireplace, coal stoves and wood stove chimney every year.
- Thin bushes and trees within 30 feet of your home. Clear a wide area of dead wood and other fire fuels.
- Store fire wood at least 30 feet from your house.
- Create a family fire escape plan that shows two ways out of every room and a family meeting place outside. Practice it at least twice a year.

Know What to Do in a Fire

- Get out fast and stay out. Crawl low under smoke.
- Call to report a fire only from outside of the burning building.
- If clothes catch fire, stop, drop to the floor or ground, and roll.
- Cover your face with your hands.

If a Wildfire Threatens Your Home

- Shut off gas at the meter.
- Hook up garden hose and place lawn sprinklers on the roof.
- Wet or pull up vegetation within 15 feet of your home.
- Submerge water-resistant valuables in a pool or pond.
- Move patio furniture inside.
- Close windows and doors.
- Prepare to evacuate immediately, if necessary. Park the car facing your escape route and leave the doors unlocked and the keys in the ignition.

Seniors Start Meal Service Program

Ages 60+, others welcome

The Eagle Mountain Senior Council is partnering with Mountainland Association of Governments to offer lunch service at the Eagle Mountain Senior Center (1680 E. Heritage Dr.). Meals are offered on Wednesdays and Thursdays, except for the first Thursday of the month (due to the recurring Senior Lunch Bunch activity, held at area restaurants).

Following are some meal program requirements:

1. Seniors aged 60+ are asked to donate \$3 per meal; others under age 60 are required to pay \$6.

2. Anyone planning to have lunch is required to make a reservation by noon of the previous day by phoning 801-789-6660, and leaving a message. Those planning to eat at every offered lunch service may make advance reservations for the month (Note - if those with an advance reservation will miss a meal, they must notify by noon on the previous day at 801-789-6660.)

3. Each senior is required to register at their first meal and will be given a meal ID card.

4. A monthly menu will be provided via email (and posted on the City website <u>calendar</u>), as well as posted at the Senior Center. An alternate meal will also be available, which you must request when you reserve.

5. If there is food left over, seniors will be offered a second serving. If there is additional food left overs, seniors may take food home. If there are full meals left over, seniors may donate another \$3 and take a meal home.

6. Additional guidelines may apply.



Eagle Mountain Seniors enjoy a variety of activities at the Senior Center, including regular craft days, such as making Halloween porch decor out of bowling pins. Check the City website <u>calendar</u> for all Senior activities.

Wildlife in Eagle Mountain Series: American Kestrel



You're most likely to see them perched on telephone wires along roadsides, in open country with short vegetation and few trees. American Kestrels occupy habitats ranging from deserts and grasslands to alpine meadows. The American Kestrel is a petite falcon roughly the same size as the Mourning Dove, but with a larger head and wider tail. From a perch or hovering, they usually drop to the ground to snatch small mammals and insects. In Eagle Mountain City we have a community program that fosters their species.

Through the efforts of our resident raptor specialist, Shon Reed, along with many volunteers and in cooperation with Hawkwatch International and Rocky Mountain Power, there are more than 20 Kestrel boxes within our city. Several residents have volunteered private property for placing some of the boxes, and Austin Robinson made some of the boxes as an Eagle Scout project. Taylor

Duncan contributed to the Kestrel box project as well. One of the nesting boxes has a donated video camera which gives a close up look at Kestrel family life from the early stages of egg laying to hatching, the male and female caring for the new hatchings and eventually observing them fledge.

"The Eagle Mountain Kestrel Project was started in response to a growing community, resulting in a loss of habitat," Shon Reed said. "We are a group of volunteers that monitor the nesting sites. Each nest is visited weekly during the nesting season by a volunteer to count eggs, nestlings and track adults. We are dedicated to preserving what habitat we can and providing nesting sites for these falcons. The American Kestrel has been in decline for more than 30 years and needs our help."

One of the attributes that makes Eagle Mountain so unique is its natural environment. The City is working to maintain as much of our natural surroundings as possible and to live in harmony with those creatures who have inhabited it long before we arrived.

Wildlife is an integral part of the culture in Eagle Mountain, as evidenced by the new Cedar Valley High School mascot - an American Kestrel.

Services

GEAR UP is a free college preparation program available at all Alpine School District high schools, including Cedar Valley and Westlake.

GEAR UP staff meet with students in the Counseling Center at the high schools. GEAR UP provides free online tutoring for high school courses, college campus visits for students and their parents, ACT prep workshops and fee waivers for ACT registration, assistance with

financial aid, college, and scholarship searching and applications, and continues to support and advocate for students through their first year of college. All GEAR UP

services and activities are free, there is no cost to participate.

OHV Trails in Eagle Mountain

Eagle Mountain City is home to an extensive network of trails – both leisure trails throughout the City and mountain trails on Lake Mountain. We are dedicated to maintaining the quality of these trail networks and ensuring excellent access to residents and visitors. Great community partners have made the trails network what it is and we appreciate their contributions.

Off-Highway Vehicle Local Regulations

Off-Highway Vehicles

The only OHVs allowed on City streets are 3 types: (Utah Code 41-22-2)

- All-Terrain Type I (ATV)
- All-Terrain Type II (Side-by-side)
- Motorcycle (Dirt bikes)

Streets

- All City streets are open to limited OHVs except the following:
 - o Pony Express Parkway
 - o Ranches Parkway
 - o SR-73
 - o Eagle Mountain Boulevard (west of the roundabout/flagpole)
 - OHVs shall not be operated on paved public trails or sidewalks
- Streets are only open to allow OHV operators to gain direct access to or from designated areas and

trails

- Lawful Crossing of Excluded Public Streets (see Crossings Map)
 - o An operator of an OHV may only cross excluded public streets or highways at City assigned crossings
 - o When crossing, the OHV must come to a complete stop, proceed only after yielding the right-of-way to oncoming traffic, and proceed at a right angle across to the other side.

Speed

- City Streets: All OHVs must not exceed 20 miles per hour on City streets
- Trails: All OHVs should not exceed 40 miles per hour

Age Requirements

- OHV operators must be at least 16 and have a valid driver's license
- A person 16 and 17 of years old must wear a DOT approved helmet

Legal Requirements

• All OHVs must be registered under the current year and should be in a plainly visible position and a registration card shall be kept with the vehicle and shall be available for a law enforcement officer (Utah Code 41-22-3)

Equipment Requirement (Utah Code 41-22-10.7)

- OHVs do not need to meet street-legal requirement
- OHVs must be equipped with
 - o Functional brakes
 - o A noise control device conforming to U.S, Forest Services standards
 - o Working headlights and taillights when operated between sunrise and sunset

The <u>OHV Trails</u> and <u>OHV Crossing</u> maps will help you experience new adventures and get to your destination safely. Trails continue to expand throughout the city. These maps are on our website and are updated as frequently as possible.

NEW: Public Art Display

The first public art display in Eagle Mountain has been established at the eastern section of Nolen Park, along Peregrine Rd. This project was started earlier this year when bird house kits were distributed to residents. Over 30 wonderfully creative bird houses were returned and have been attached to posts to build this public art display.

The project was sponsored by Eagle Mountain City in partnership with others in the community. The Eagle Mountain Arts Alliance (EMAA) helped distribute the bird houses and held a painting activity. Cole Thomas, a Boy Scout from Eagle Mountain treated the bird houses, attached them to the poles, and installed the poles as part of his Eagle Scout project. It is built in such a way to allow more bird houses to be added in the future if the community is interested.


