13.30.010 Sprinkler irrigation hours restricted.

It shall be unlawful for the owner or person in control of a sprinkler irrigation system connected to the Eagle Mountain City water system to operate an irrigation system during the day between the hours of 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. of each day.

13.30.020 Violation – Penalty. Violations of this chapter shall be punished as follows:

A. First offense: written warning. B. Second offense: termination of water service. Water service terminated for violation of EMMC 13.30.010 shall not be restored until after payment of a \$100.00 reconnection charge is paid to the city.

13.20.160 Waste prohibited. It shall be unlawful for any water

user to waste water, or allow it to be wasted, by imperfect stops, taps, valves, leaky joints or pipes, or allow tanks or water troughs to leak or overflow or to wastefully run water from hydrants, faucets, or stops or through basins, water closets, urinals, sinks, or apparatus or to use water in violation of the rules, regulations, or ordinances for controlling the city water system.

Keeping your head above water

Swimming is a great recreational sport that can be enjoyed by people of all ages. Whether it's at home, the beach or the lake, swimming is a great way to cool off during hot weather.

Water is everywhere, and that can make people think that it all functions the same. Although people can drown in something as simple as a bathtub or hot tub given the right conditions, each body of water has its own risks and safety recommendations. Any water source can be a source of injury or even death if people do not take it seriously, particularly for infants and young children.

Attention to safety in all types of water helps people ensure that everyone in the family can have a good time without putting themselves at unnecessary risk. Using safety equipment consistently and correctly makes it easier to protect people in more dangerous situations.

A day spent swimming is likely to end well if all adults are willing and able to provide supervision for themselves and children. They should plan to:

- Select a day free of storms, if the water is located outside
- Inspect the swimming area for possible hazards
- Keep life jackets and throwing implements handy
- Have young children or inexperienced swimmers wear U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jackets around water, but do not rely on life jackets alone
- -Swim in an area with lifeguards on duty
- Always swim with a buddy; do not allow anyone to swim alone.
- Never leave a child to monitor other children swimming
- Stay within arm's reach of any untrained swimmer or child under age five
- Avoid drinking alco-

hol or consuming other substances that inhibit concentration

- Minimize distractions and keep children in sight can make the experience safer and more enjoyable.



Always swim with a buddy; do not allow anyone to swim alone.

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Experience swimming in a pool does not always translate accurately to swimming in natural bodies of water. Pools are generally free of rocks, branches, kelp or other items that can tangle a swimmer. Fast-moving rivers or bodies of water with a tide can create currents that trap even a strong swimmer. Even hot tubs can pose risks. Everyone should pay close attention to the best ways to stay safe depending on the water type.

The importance of engineering in construction

t is a wonderful time of year.

As school ends and summer begins, residents will use the nice weather to undertake home construction projects. When the Building department reviews various construction projects, we often find that plans will need to be designed or verified by an engineer.

Big box stores will sell sheds, pergolas and accessory buildings that may not be designed to withstand the elements in Eagle Mountain. This can cause frustration when one pays for a building and finds out that they cannot proceed until they have it approved by a structural engineer. Structures that are over 200 sq. ft. and other projects such as basement walkouts or retaining walls will also need engineering. It can come as a surprise that the project can have extra costs and time delays.

Structural engineering is a critical component in the design and construction of buildings.

Its primary aim is to ensure that the building is safe, stable and able to withstand the various loads and forces that it will encounter during its lifetime. A well-designed and properly executed structural system is essential for ensuring the longevity and safety of a building.

Structural engineers must ensure that the building design complies with building codes and regulations. These codes specify minimum requirements for the strength and stability of buildings, and the structural engineer must ensure that the building meets or exceeds these requirements. Utah's adopted building code also differs from other states. It is important that your project is designed to the current standards.
